## KITCHEN PLAN SAVES STEPS

Thousands of steps can be saved in the average kitchen, if the Canadian housewife will rearrange her work centres — refrigerator, sink and stove for greatest efficiency. One-fifth the length of a city block is trodden out by many housewives in the preparation of a single meal, while others walk several times that distance, reports the Lever Canadian Homes Survey, after visiting kitchens all across Canada. Large kitchens, small kitchens, square, oblong and ell-shaped kitchens all are guilty, lacking the proper grouping of work centres, the survey finds.

Correct arrangement places the coal or wood stove near the outside door, with the sink on its left and the refrigerator or food cupboard to the right of the sink again, close to the dining room entrance. Locating the coal stove handsily, but should be simplified the chore of emptying ashes and carrying in wood, also keeps dust and dirt from the rest of the kitchen.

When a gas or electric range is used, reverse the order, with refrigerator near the back door, sink

number of varieties found in the cargoes was much greater than today. The greatest number in any one year was thirty-three varieties in 1 Manitoba Northern in 1934. The number in this grade today, averages less than ten, of which the four rust resistant varieties make up 65 per cent of the cargoes. One cargo had as few as six varieties, 86 per cent of which was made up of rust resistant wheats and the rest of Red Bobs and one other wheat. Briefly summarizing the results of this year's verification tests, one could say that the percentage of good milling and baking wheats has been well maintained, and that the moisture and protein quality wheats are lessening in both number and the percentage found.

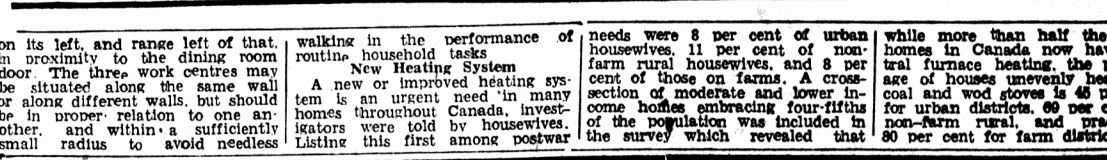

**VARIETIES ENTERING INTO EXPORT CARGOES**  
(Experimental Farm News)  
Each year, since 1923, the Cereal Division has prepared a report on the varietal composition of samples of wheat taken from cargoes leaving the Ports of Fort William, Ontario; Vancouver, British Columbia; and, when conditions permit, from Fort Churchill and Montreal. These are official samples obtained through the Chief Inspector, Board of Grain Commissioners, representing a cross section of the season's shipments from these various ports, states J. G. C. Fraser, Cereal Division, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.  
The bulk of the cargoes examined this season originated at Fort

William. Although originally intended as a means of following the trend and expansion of new varieties as they were introduced this annual survey has proven so valuable in other respects that it has been continued over the years. When the survey was started, Marquis was the leading variety and up to 1936, composed as high as 72 per cent of the wheat found in the one Manitoba Northern Grade. Garnet up to 1934, was a big contributor to the 2 Manitoba Northern grade and, in the 3 Manitoba Northern grade, rose as high as 74 per cent. Recently, introduced a few years later, never showed much prominence in the overseas cargoes. After the licensing of the Thatcher in 1939, it took about two years to make its appearance in the car-

goes leaving Fort William and Vancouver. It increased much more rapidly from the former Port, rising in the 1944 crop, just analysed, to over 66 per cent in the 1 Manitoba Northern grade, and to a lesser degree in the 3 and 4 Manitoba Northern grades.  
—The other rust resistant wheats taken about two years since their introduction to appear in the export cargoes. Their increases have not been as spectacular as that of the Thatcher variety, but combined with the latter, now make up the bulk of the wheat entering into the cargoes going overseas. Recent has risen to a higher percentage than either of the other two varieties mentioned. Such varieties as Oranus, Crest, Early Red Fife, Reliance and Ruby are fast becoming "trace" varieties, or have already disappeared. Red Bobs has risen from comparative obscurity to some prominence, especially in the Pacific Coast cargoes, but is declining somewhat in the Fort William cargoes.  
Once prominent, but now mediocre varieties, like Ironon, Preston, Stanley, Pretude, Amnister and Quality are found in lessening percentages while poor varieties such as Ladoga, White Russian, Club and Vermilion are rarely, if ever, found in cargoes today. In other words the greater percentage (96 per cent and better) of the cargoes is composed of good milling and baking quality wheats.

In the early days, the total
