Present Aerial Blows May Be Dwarfed Shortly

Three Italian Islands Hit

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, May 26—(AP)—The Allies will be struck by aerial blows of such magnitude as to dwarf yesterday's terrific hammering in which nearly 400 planes blasted and burned the island outposts of Sicily, Sardinia and Pantelleria, authoritative sources declared today.

Yesterday's loss of 11 planes was described as "remarkably small in view of the large attacking forces and proof of the superiority of equipment and leadership."

Claims Japs Plan Invasion Of The U.S.A.

WASHINGTON, May 26—(AP)—A Korean leader, who said he predicted the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor two months before it occurred, told the United States House of Representatives today that the Japanese plan to offer China a separate peace not later than September and that officers already have been chosen by Premier Tojo to head an invasion army against the United States.

Resistance Crumbling On Attu Island

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—Japanese resistance on Attu Island collapsed today to be crumbling fast with one of the enemy's last three main positions in American hands and a second under violent assault.

Heavy Fighting Is Renewed In Caucasus

LONDON, May 26 (AP)—Heavy fighting was renewed today in the Caucasus where a force of 100 Germans was thrown back with heavy losses in an attack in the lower Kuban River, the Russians reported today.

Two N.S. Coal Miners Lose Lives In Fire

NEW WATERFORD, N.S., May 26—(CP)—Two miners lost their lives today and seven others were injured when fire of undetermined origin broke out in the east section of Dominion Coal Company's No. 12 mine here, sending smoke and flames billowing through the pit and neighboring workings.

Conference Of Mayors Continues

OTTAWA, May 26—(CP)—Arthur Collins, British municipal authority, said today in an address to the conference of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities that British civilian defenses were never once knocked out during the German blitz but German civilian defenses are being completely knocked out by the kind of concentrated bombing attack now being delivered by United Nations air forces on German cities.

Enemy Loses Long Lead In Use Of Air Weapon

LONDON, May 26—(CP)—Two years ago, even one year ago, nobody would dare say it but the fact is that the considered view now of air authorities is that the German air force has been exposed to use air power as a weapon of war. The quote is from Air Chief Marshal Sir Arthur Tedder, the statement is all the more startling when it is remembered that the German air force, in the early stages of this war, carried co-operation with the army to what then seemed remarkable lengths.

Save 19 Survivors

Alfred Russell of Tofield, Alta., to 19 survivors of a ship torpedoed in the North Atlantic provided the means whereby a Canadian destroyer was directed to their rescue, the Air Ministry news service reported today.

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2,000 Tons Of Bombs Smash Duesseldorf

Only Foretaste Of Blows Planned For War Plants.

LONDON, May 26—(AP)—The R.A.F. with the R. C. A. F. lending strong support, bashed the German arms centre of Duesseldorf with nearly 2,000 tons of explosives last night while an armada from North Africa gave another "get-out-of-the-war" warning to Italy in a paralyzing attack eliciting cries of pain and anger from the weaker Axis partner.

A total of nearly 900 planes based in Britain and Africa struck the Axis in a violent general aerial offensive which authoritative sources said was just a foretaste of greater blows aimed at tearing out by the roots the enemy's war-making capacities.
