RECORD CARGO.—The Car Ferry steamer upon her arrival in Charlottetown at 9.35 yesterday morning brought the largest cargo of freight ever brought here from Pictou. The cargo included 2 cars corn, 1 car molasses, 1 car wheat, 2 cars sugar, 2 cars paper, 3 cars flour, 1 car butter tubs, 1 car salt, 1 car binder twine, 1 car vinegar, 2 cars oil, 1 car barrels and four cars of mixed freight.

HOME FROM FRANCE.—Sergt. Aubrey Beer of the Army Dental Corps, accompanied from Pictou by his father, Mr. A. F. Bell, City, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday by the Car Ferry steamer. Sergt. Beer crossed from England to France in September last and after remaining there several weeks was transferred back to Shorncliffe, where he was engaged in hospital work. He contracted pneumonia several months ago and was ill for some time, upon the advice of physicians he was ordered home on account of his health.

MCDONALD CONSOLIDATED—SCHOOL.

A double headed excursion train will leave Murray Harbor on Monday morning next and after visiting the experimental farm will arrive at the Consolidated school about 3 p. m. Treasures by Mr. George R. Barr, Chief of the Federal Dairy Division, Rev. Father Gauthier and Mr. Andrew McEae will be delivered after which the train will proceed to Murray Harbor. A short meeting relative to Railway Time table will also be held. Refreshments will be served in the afternoon and evening when the speakers will again take the platform. The people of the surrounding districts are invited to attend at least one of the meetings. A musical programme is being prepared for the evening session. This entertainment is the first to be promoted by the working committee of 21, which has recently been appointed by the new school trustees and therefore should be worthy of the people's support. The proceeds are to be used by the community club to further their work and many enjoyable social and educational gatherings will be arranged later at the same place. 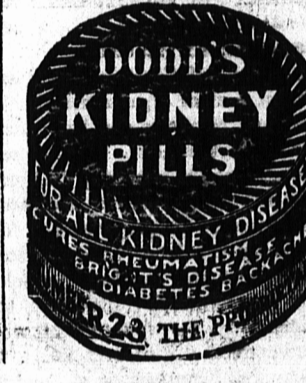
