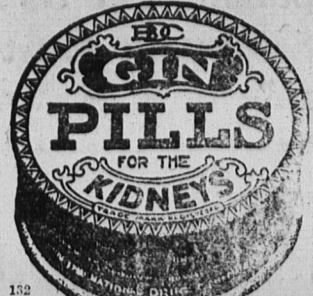

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must first appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is not formed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 1/2 acre and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. GERMANY AS SEEN THROUGH HER PRESS

As a fair sample of what is being said in the German press relative to the entry of the United States into the war here is an extract from an article by Captain Persius in the Berliner Tageblatt, from which one may gather the fears and anxieties that the German mind in connection with America's aid to her allies. "Do they expect in England, that the participation of the American fleet in the war will completely alter the conditions? No serious thinking Englishman can cherish such a hope. What the combined Entente fleets have failed to do will hardly be achieved by the addition of the United States Navy. At the same time, one must not underestimate the capacity and business spirit of the Yankee. We are far from understanding the warlike enthusiasm of the Americans and their devotion to their country, which they believe is fighting in a just cause, but the cool, calculating brain of the American will probably come to quite a different conclusion from that of the British optimist. Not the whole United States fleet will affect our experienced and well-tried submarines, and in all probability the American fleet will no more be able to strangle the submarines than the English, for whatever happens the submarines will come out of their bases, which the enemy have in vain endeavored to destroy on the Belgian coast. They would find this work of destruction still more difficult if our submarine bases were moved to the German coast, where strong defences were already built in peace time."

ent of the New York Herald, that any reference has been made in a German paper to a possible removal of the German submarine bases to the German coast. The German public, who would no doubt be greatly alarmed by the loss of the Belgian coast, is thus apparently being prepared for the possible event, which is wrapped up in the usual persiflage about the impenetrability of the U-boat. The German public was prepared in a similar way for the loss of positions on the Somme and the Arras fronts, which were said to be invulnerable at one time, by a sudden stream of articles which attempted to prove that the German front lines were not vitally important, and that still better defences had been prepared in the rear. One may gather, indeed, from the whole tone of Captain Persius' article that he is growing increasingly nervous about the success of the submarine, although he does his utmost to cheer his readers. For some time the press of the Fatherland has seethed with indignation at the intimation so plainly conveyed from the Entente countries that they are prepared to treat with a demoralizing hierarchy. That feeling has since been brought to boiling point by President Wilson's note.

"We Are the People."

"It is one of the insolences which our enemies," says the Kolnische Zeitung, "dare to trumpet forth, that the destruction of Prussian 'militarism' and the 'democratization' of Germany are to be preliminary conditions of peace. In rare moments of candour they have betrayed their hope that, by substituting parliamentary government for our strong monarchy, Germany's power of resistance would be broken and the end would be in sight. essor of political economy in the Presidential chair of the North American Republic, declares that not with the great German nation is he at war, nor can the 'free peoples' of the world treat for peace with the government which that 'great nation' itself has elected. Before he entered into the war Herr Wilson had sufficient opportunity in Russia for the exercise of his emancipatory yearnings. But we cannot recall any attempts of his in that quarter. It is only to us that his humanitarian sympathies extend; only our poor German people that he would liberate. For us Germans, as for others, this war has been a bitter ordeal; we also wish to, and shall emerge from it renewed—democratized, if one will. But what we do we shall do for ourselves and not at the dictation of our well-wishers in the Western democracies. We are strong enough to share our own fortunes, and the problems which are presented to us as new from London, Paris and New York are such as we have dealt with at the time when the Americans were still fighting the red Indians with Grewater. We alone possess the strong uniform leadership which ensures victory.

Wrathful Chorus of Press

From the wrathful chorus of the Pan-German press a few brief examples may be interesting. The Deutsche Tages Zeitung exclaims: "These tactics are perfectly plain. The United States, as well as our other enemies, would use the so-called majority in the German Reichstag to unroll the constitution of the German Empire. They know that by this means they would clear the way for a process of disintegration which would speedily accomplish what a world of enemies cannot achieve by force of arms." The Deutsche Zeitung, the newly founded organ of the great industries, says: "President Wilson recognizes clearly whether the road taken by Erzberger, Schiedemann and company would lead to the fall of the Hohenzollern dynasty and to calamity for the German people." The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger, which has recently been acquired by the industrial combination expressed itself thus forcibly: "The lying character of the Wilson phraseology is clearly shown if one takes notice of the Hohenzollern dynasty and to calamity for the German people." Reform Must Come

Less violent in tone, if more to the purpose, is the Berlin National Liberal and Bozen Zeitung. In a leading article, which reveals a marked advance in the views of its party, this journal says: "The German, after the political lessons of war, now expects from his Government a wide extension of popular rights—the right of participation in the Imperial concerns of the state and control of Government measures. In this sense, the German Government, or more correctly said, the German body politic will have to be reformed; of that no doubt can an longer exist. But it cannot too often or too emphatically be stated that this is solely a German concern. Equally certain is it that the German nation carries a sufficient bond that pledges of its Government are likewise the pledges of the people. Thus far have we already come. There no longer exists a German Government which can act counter to the will of the people nor can there be such Government in the future. This guarantee is already there, but the Entente will not see it. The Entente desires war, so we also are compelled to wish it."

Dramatic Attacks on Balloon Observers.

(Canadian War Records.) Relative quiet has prevailed on Lens front. There have been dramatic attacks upon our balloon observers. In one an enemy airman suddenly darted out from among fleecy clouds and fired upon a balloon occupant, who was spotting for our guns at a great altitude. The balloon was set on fire. The observer unhooked the parachute and jumped clear. Anti-aircraft guns opened on the airman, and it is thought, wounded him, for on his way back to his own lines his plain behaved as if guided by a semi-conscious man. The whole incident did not occupy three minutes' time. In the second attack the enemy airman darted out from a concealing haze just before sunset, firing as he came. The observer jumped, and an artillery observation aeroplane near by hastened up. Although entirely unclassified by the fast fighting German single-seater, he tackled the foe, but was forced to volplane to the ground. As the German turned to up at an incredible speed, and wheeling above him, opened fire. He sought to manoeuvre for position, but before he could swing into a position favorable for the use of his weapon, his plane was riddled, and he was shot through both wrists. With splendid pluck, he controlled his falling plane, and came to earth without further injury. His reception was not cordial, but Canadian soldiers do not fight against wounded men. The decorations he wore showed that the Kaiser had done him much honor for aerial exploits.
