

LIFE IN SWISS PRISONS.

So Easy that Convicts Have Little Desire to Escape.

(From the Los Angeles Examiner.)

Prison life in Switzerland is a luxury instead of a punishment. The coate opera jail at Thorburg, where the inmates did as they pleased, has only recently been suppressed by the Bern authorities.

A correspondent of a Lausanne paper states that he was passing through Sarnen when he saw a number of men dressed in dark blue clothes with white stripes walking about the village smoking and joking. Others were seated in a cafe, and some were working in a leisurely manner carrying bricks for the construction of a new building.

These convicts are permitted to leave the prison early in the morning and find work around Sarnen or walk about the country until nightfall, when they return of their own accord to the prison.

SPAIN AND VATICAN.

ROME, September 10. — Premier Canalejas' reiteration of the government's refusal to withdraw the Padlock Bill, brings the negotiations between the Vatican and Spain to a standstill.

The Holy See will now await the meeting of the Cortes, when, if Canalejas does not fall, a complete rupture between Rome and Madrid is considered almost inevitable.

Yesterday in St. Peter's Cathedral there was celebrated the Bicentenary of the Church of England in Canada. The ceremonies on this occasion were impressive, the officiating clergymen being Rev. Father W. H. Van Allen, of the church of the Advent, Boston, who occupied the pulpit morning and evening, Canon Vroom, King's College, Windsor, who officiated at the celebration of Holy Communion in the morning, and Canon Simpson.

HOW SOME MAKE BREAD.

In visiting Greece I was struck with the primitive ovens built behind most of the houses in small towns, says a Greece letter in the Bakers' Weekly. They were like large beehives, built of clay; they were evidently solid up to the sole, then had the arched roof over, with a door at one side.

They are heated with fires of straw and twigs and when ready for use are swept out, the dough put in and the opening stopped up with stones and clay till the bread is cooked.

Structures like these are typical of the ovens found in many lands where men have had to evolve appliances for various uses from the materials they had at hand.

This in some places we find holes dug in the earth and lined with stones in which a fire is kept burning until sufficient heat is raised, the bread being then put in and a stone laid over the opening, with a fire on it to keep up the cooking heat.

In these ovens, we are told, the South Sea Islanders bake their bread, fruit and yams, and roast their pork, and doubtless they answer their purposes very well. In some eastern countries fire is put into a large earthen jar with small mouth and sloping sides, the cakes of bread being stuck on the outside of the jar to bake.

Then we know the old fashioned griddle, so much used in old Scotch houses, on which scones, bannocks and oatcakes are fried. This is also employed in Scandinavia for baking the universal "Flad brod," and it is also in use in many other countries in various shapes.

In Cornwall the old kettle style of oven is still used for home baking the dough being laid on the hot hearthstone, with a large round iron pot inverted over it. Five handfuls of this keeps up the baking heat, the Cornish "kettle bread" is very good eating indeed, even if it is a little puddingly in the centre sometimes.

Even more primitive means of baking have to be used sometimes, as when the Australian digger rolls up his "damper" in leaves and covers it with hot ashes to bake, but still all methods from hot stones to dry plate ovens are used for the one great purpose, to make bread, and the variety of means used for this end goes to show the universal importance of that article. Regular bakehouses with proper ovens seem to have been in use, however, for hundreds of years, and doubtless many relics of them are still in existence.
