Satin plays an important part in the new millinery, as also Ottoman silk and lustrous velvets, with which the striking large Directoire shapes are plainly covered.

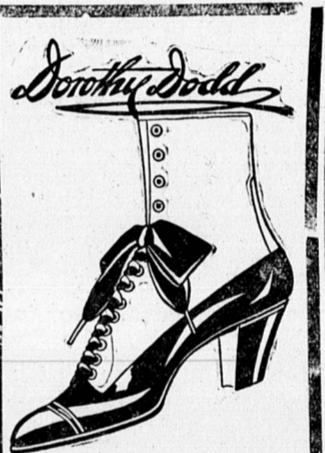

Warning to Electors.

Treating.

The giving or causing to be given to any voter on an election day or polling day on account of the voter, having voted or being about to vote, any meat, drink, or refreshment, or any money or ticket to procure refreshment, is an unlawful act, subjecting the offender to a penalty for each offence of \$10 and costs to any person who sues therefor.

Undue Influence.

Any force, violence, or restraint, or threat of violence, injury, damage, harm or loss, or any manner of intimidation practiced upon or against any voter to induce him to vote or refrain from voting for a candidate is an indictable offence and subjects the offender to a penalty of \$200 and costs in addition to any other penalty thereby incurred.

Any one who by any force, or false or fraudulent pretence or contrivance prevents or interferes with the free exercise of the franchise of any voter or by such means induces a voter to vote for a candidate or to refrain from voting is guilty of an indictable offence.

Conveying Voters to Polls.

Any person on behalf of a candidate, who hires or pays for or promises to pay for conveying any voter to or from the polls at an election, whether conveyed by horse, carriage, steamboat, vessel or other conveyance commits an unlawful act which disqualifies him from voting at such election and for every such offence he shall forfeit \$100 to any person who sues therefor.

Hiring out team &c.

Every person demanding or receiving payment from any person on behalf of a candidate or from the candidate himself for the use of any team or other conveyance for conveying any voter to or from the poll is guilty of an unlawful act and liable to forfeit \$100 to any person who sues therefor.

Personation or voting twice.

Personating another voter, or attempting to vote more than once at an election is subject to a penalty of from \$50 to \$200, and the imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years and not less than six months.

Aiding or procuring personation also subjects the offender to fine and imprisonment.

A Candidate who endeavors to induce personation or to take a false oath is guilty of an indictable offence.
