In a quiet, white hospital room in Montreal, "Toby" McMillan came to the end of the trail at midnight, Friday, and with his passing, Charlottetown lost not only a valuable citizen but also one of her former athletic greats.

It is hard to realize that the quiet, kindly voice of the man who had secured brilliant achievements on athletic fields in his prime and who later became a well-known figure in the interests of the up-and-coming athletic stars, will be heard no more.

But such is death and this time the less will be felt keenly in all circles where "Toby's" presence was known. A presence that always added something to the gathering. A true sportsman, his advice was eagerly sought and put as eagerly into effect. A presence whose code and it was a code that he stuck to rigidly.

As a competitor he was a hard fighter, but always a fair one. As the days of his triumphs waned he went on to further triumphs as official at athletic gatherings, invariably he ruled with an iron hand, but the status of the man was such that no matter how the decision appeared at the time, one just had to come to the conclusion that "Toby" was right.

"Toby's" death came right on the heels of the Junior Royals' great triumph Friday night, and how well "Toby" would have enjoyed being there to see the kids in their hour of glory! It was sounded here Saturday night and the emphasis was on practically all the trumpeting by the Canadiens.

And so we write "R" to "Toby" McMillan's career, and might we add that it is a foregone conclusion that "Toby" answered his final summons with the same fine courage that exemplified his life here.

More words cannot describe the sorrow we experience in his passing, but to the family in their great loss the sympathy of this column is sincerely extended.
