Rural Credit Scheme
OTTAWA, April 14.—The Government's rural credit scheme is expected to be before the House this week. Main lines of the scheme have been decided. It is understood that the bill is practically ready for submission.

The scheme is a broad departure from that of last session. Then the proposal was a loan to the provinces of ten millions to enable them to make long term advances to farmers. The bill passed the House but failed to go through the Senate.

This year's proposal, according to gossip, follows rather the American scheme of land banks with modifications to meet Canadian conditions. Both dominion and provincial governments it is stated, are to co-operate in the scheme.

National System of Banking

OTTAWA, April 14.—Private Members' day in the House of Commons was devoted to discussion of a resolution declaring that the time was ripe for the establishment of a national system of banking in Canada.

J. S. Woodsworth, Labor member for Winnipeg North Centre, was the mover. He made it clear that he did not expect the House to declare itself on such an important resolution. He hoped, however, that the Minister of Finance would agree to its reference to the banking and commerce committee of the House.

This, Hon. J. A. Robb made no objection to, only stipulating that witnesses who knew nothing of banking should not be summoned to appear before the committee.

Mr. Woodsworth said that private banks in Canada had reached a point where they could practically dictate the financial policy of the country. He outlined the privileges granted to the Bank. They issued currency and controlled credit. Through interlocking directorates they were able to assume control of many large and supposedly independent business corporations. Currency he believed, should be issued only by the government.

Traffic on Great Lakes Less In '925 Than in 1924

(Special to the Guardian)
WASHINGTON, April 12.—Foreign commerce traffic on the Great Lakes was nearly 1,900,000 cargo tons less in volume in 1925 than in 1924, the bureau of research of the United States Shipping Board pointed out today in the fourth of a series of analysis reports on foreign trade fluctuations. The 1924 movement was 11,825,000 cargo tons.

The analysis revealed radical changes in traffic and a decline in coal exports through Great Lakes ports to Canadian destinations. The decline was taken as indicating that a large part of the export Canadian grain previously handled through United States lake and sea ports have been diverted to Canada routes to the seaboard.

Coal exports from Buffalo, Fairhaven, Oswego and Rochester to Canadian points from 965,000 tons in 1924 to 554,000 tons in 1925 and the Ohio coal export of 3,981,000 tons in 1924, was reduced to 3,000,961,000 in 1925 was reduced to 3,310,000 tons in 1925.

Prove to be Excellent Foils for Each Other in New Henry Film.

Another perfect screen combination has been effected, this time by the presence of Charles Ray and Eleanor Boardman in one picture. The lovely Eleanor Boardman has one of the finest roles of her career. There is something very real about this young woman's impersonation, and her principal appeal probably lies in the fact that most of us have known girls much like her. Seldom is acting ability, beauty and charm combined to such a degree as it is in Miss Boardman. In this film she plays the role of a young girl who deserts her husband on the day of their marriage on learning of his rakish and indolent past.

The secret of their marriage is kept by the estranged couple, and the abandoned young man goes to work to prove to her his worth and industry. He makes good, but becomes the object of much feminine affection, thereby arousing the jealousy of his d'adantful wife. She retaliates by accepting the attentions of a wealthy young man, greatly to her husband's alarm. The final reconciliation is adroitly set forth.

Sally O'Neil and Ernest Gillan as the two Lane children give very fine performances, while Charles Clark, David Torrence, James Corrigan, Forrest Seabury and Ned Sparks distinguish themselves in smaller roles.

GOLD SPRING, N. Y., April 13.—Frances Heenan, known as "Peaches" to her friends and as the 15-year-old Cinderella to the newspaper public, spent the first day of her honeymoon (Wed. 13) at 51-year-old Prince Charming, Edward W. Browning, secluded in a 15-room house near the Hudson River.

The second Mrs. Browning, who until recently had been confined to her room in her mother's small Washington Heights apartment in New York, suffering from acid burns mysteriously received, was today the mistress of a two-acre estate. HALIFAX, April 14.—An enthusiastic meeting of the workers in the Halifax-Dartmouth campaign for the University of King's College Building-Endowment Fund was held Tuesday evening, when an additional \$6,679 was reported subscribed, bringing the total of the City Campaign to date to \$112,107.75.

With the \$5,700 preliminary contribution from outside sources, this brings the grand total to \$118,007.75.
