

Anti-Aircraft Wins Free-For-All At New Glasgow Race Meet

It's a little warm for hockey talk but Dud James, former Moncton Hawks forward, has been named manager of the Moncton Stadium hockey team. James is not letting that deter him from carrying through plans for a Maritime Senior Hockey League next winter.

Pratt broke into major professional hockey with New York Rangers in 1936. A hard hitting defenseman and one of the most popular players in the league, he set an all-time record for scoring in 1944. He collected 17 goals and 40 assists for 57 points. Last year Pratt played in 41 games scoring five goals and 20 assists for a total of 25 points. He served 36 minutes in penalties.

He is one of the biggest defensemen in the N.H.L. weighing over 212 pounds and standing six feet two and a half inches tall. During the summer Pratt is a railway switchman. Colorful Gene Sarazen, one of the few top-notch golfers to still wear "plus fours" will be teeing off today in the Canadian Open at Beaufort. However, of all the big time tournaments Gene has, he hasn't got on his slate the Canadian Open. He ran second to Leo Diegel in 1922, but that was as close as he has come to taking our national diadem.

Twice winner of the United States Open and twice runner-up Sarazen is still considered a great shot-maker and a masterful iron player although he has never held the Claret Cup denoting Canadian golf supremacy. In recent years he has not participated in the professional circuit, but has picked his spots. In the past 27 years he has never missed competition in the U. S. Open. Back in the days when Walter Hagen was in his prime, Little Gene was Sir Walter's most bitter rival. The tales of their domestic duels still provide fodder for locker-room debates.

Some of the big guns of golf have decided to pass up the Open. Byron Nelson won't be on hand to defend the title which he won last year and Ben Hogan, his year's leading money winner, has "went way home" in the Masters tournament at Atlanta, Ga.

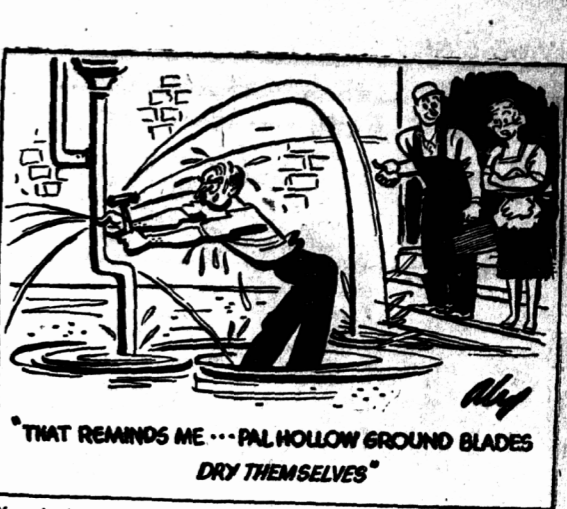
