THE steam launch Ostrea, built especially for A. E. Kempf, the oyster expert, is at the Steam Navigation Company's wharf. The Ostrea is a beautifully constructed steamer, and has excellent accommodations considering her length and draught of water, the latter being only four feet. The little steamer will develop a speed of eight knots an hour. The builders were Burrell, Johnson & Co., of Yarmouth, N. S.

THE wreck of the Tiber at White Point, is now being operated upon by the purbers. The weather has proved boisterous, and only an occasional day is suitable for the prosecution of the work. It will be remembered that this steamer was lost sight of for some weeks, after leaving her Cape Breton port loaded with coal for Halifax, and was found in thirty feet of water at White Point, by Howard McKenzie a young fisherman of Canso, while attending his lobster trawls. The Tiber was a frequent visitor to Charlottetown.

A Boston despatch of July 1st says: The steamer Halifax of the Plant line sailed from Lewis' wharf at noon today with the members of the Glazier Labrador expedition party on board. This party, in charge of Col. Willard G. Glazier, is bound for the great peninsula, of which so little is known, on a three months' tour of exploration. The party will make stops at Halifax, North Sydney and St. John, N. E., where the equipment for the expedition will be completed.

THE apple crop of the province, Rev. Father Burke, President of the Fruit Growers Association, assures us is most promising. An abundance of fruit has set despite the wet weather and apples will under ordinary circumstances be a big crop. Cherries and other stone fruits will be scarce owing to late frosts. Nova Scotia has lost about all its apple crop from the same cause. There will be few Gravensteins and therefore our Gravensteins will have a free field and ought to bring good money. The small fruits, gooseberries and currants promise well.

A New Haven despatch of July 1st says: Incident to the suit brought against the executors of the Henry B. Plant estate by Charles B. and Horace G. Hoadley of Waterbury, who are contesting the removal of the Plant property to New York, an attachment was placed to-day on \$17,000,000 in stock held by the Plant Investment Co. This company is owner of the Plant system railways and steamships and the attachment was served on the assistant secretary of the company, Paul Harrison, of this city. Attachments amounting to \$100,000 have been placed also in the same suit on real estate of the millionaire in Connecticut.

CRAPAUD will be the scene of great doings tomorrow. The gigantic tea party comes off in connection with the church people of that vicinity. THE heavy travel on Tuesday from the mainland when some three hundred passengers came over on the Northumberland seems to have delayed the express which only reached the city at eleven o'clock. A gentleman who is a close observer of our railroad service in referring to the delay said that it is to be regretted that proper conveniences for the speedy transfer of baggage at Painswick is not afforded and thus the greater part of the delay obviated. Once one leaves the main line of the I. C. R. to come to Point du Chene the service becomes unmistakably inferior. He contends that the management should have the P. E. Island interests more in view and save these annoying delays now that travel is setting in heavy.

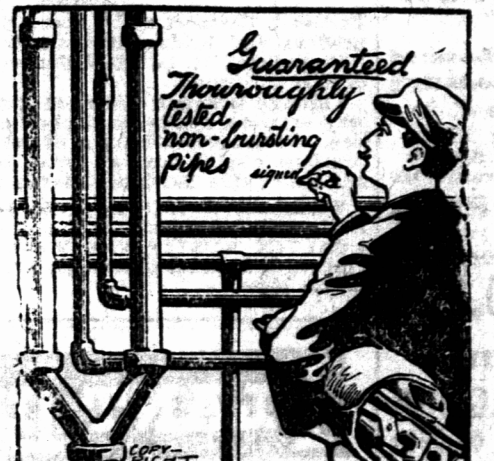

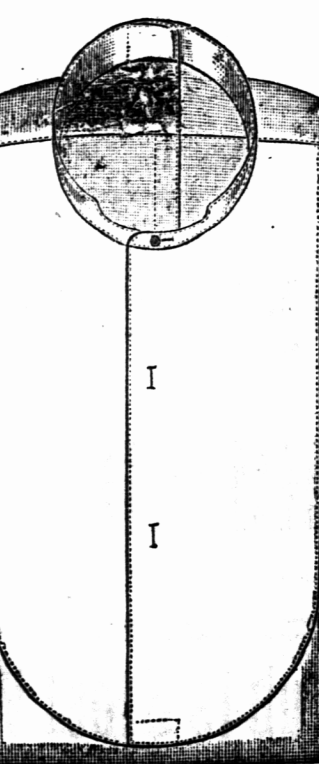
