CANADA IN FLANDERS.—The second volume of "Canada in Flanders" by Lord Beaverbrook (Sir Max Aitken) has just been issued. It contains the story so well begun in the first volume of Canada's part in the war, a story which will live forever in the world's history and one of which Canadians will forever be proud. It would be useless to attempt even a summary of what the book contains; it is enough to say that it tells in masterly diction, and descriptive power what the Canadians who did what they attempted, what they did, during the second terrible year of the war; it tells of glorious successes and of glorious failures, but never of dereliction of duty or unheroic conduct of which there was none to record. The book should be in every Canadian home, in the hands of every Canadian boy and girl, for it tells of the beginning of Canada's real national life, the birth of the real Canadian nation.

FUR FARMING IN RUSSIA.—The Russian Government has lately issued a report of 256 pages on Fur Farming. The author, Mr. Vladimir Gerasimov visited Prince Edward Island in 1912 as a member of the Commission of Conservation, Ottawa. In the company of Mr. J. Walter Jones to whom he gives grateful acknowledgements in his preface. He also mentions Mr. Wesley Frost, erstwhile United States Consul at Charlottetown. Many P. E. I. scenes are reproduced and faces familiar to the fur farming world appear in a dozen instances. The report is in the Russian language, but the figures and tables are in the vernacular and demonstrate clearly the rising economic importance of domestic fur production. Such a work will do much to encourage the establishment of the fur farming industry in Russia and in Siberia particularly and as silver foxes are rare there, it is not unlikely that importations from P. E. I. may occur. Mr. Gerasimov is to be congratulated on the evidently careful report he has made and the Guardian expresses its thanks for his courtesy in sending copies. It is hoped he can again visit this province for further information along the lines of his favorite research. Mr. Gerasimov is a plebeian and as such will stand in well with the new government in Russia. If the untitled and titled nobility of Russia have lost their position as rulers in that country they may now take more interest in the development of their estates, and turn to such interesting and profitable-making an industry as Black Fox Farming.

IN MEMORIAM
 DR. THOMAS E. CUNNINGHAM.
 After an illness of several months Dr. Thomas E. Cunningham, well known Cambridge physician, died at his home, 347 Massachusetts avenue, yesterday at 8 o'clock, Cambridge, Mass. He was 65 years of age. Two of his brothers and both his sons are physicians. Funeral services will be held at St. Mary's Church tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock and burial will be at St. Paul's Cemetery, Arlington. He was born in Miscouche, Prince Edward Island and came to Cambridge about 45 years ago. He was graduated from the Harvard Medical School with the class of '75 and was for a time visiting physician at the Holy Ghost Hospital. He is survived by two sons, Dr. Edward A. Cunningham of Belmont and Dr. T. E. Cunningham of Cambridge, and by his wife, formerly Miss Mary Kane. He is also survived by four brothers, former Commissioner of Public Safety of Cambridge, Henry J. Cunningham, John Cunningham, a Central Square druggist, and Dr. Wilfrid B. Cunningham of New York and Dr. J. H. Cunningham of Cambridge. Three sisters survive. They are Miss Agatha Cunningham and Miss Elizabeth Cunningham, both of Cambridge, and Mrs. W. J. O'Donnell.
