PROMPT ACTION.—Another meeting of the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held Tuesday afternoon. It was called following upon the receipt of a telegram from St. John advising that unless prompt action was taken on and pressure brought to bear upon the Federal Cabinet the recommendations of the Duncan Royal Commission in respect to lower freight rates for the Maritimes would not be implemented by legislation at the approaching session of Parliament. 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Meeting of United Church Presbytery: The P. E. I. Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in Harris Hall Tuesday, Feb. 1st. There was a very large attendance both of Ministers and elders, and a long docket of business completed. The Rev. F. E. Boothroyd of York being in the chair and Rev. E. Lockhart of Souris at the secretary's desk.

A call from the Cavendish Church which includes Stanley New Glasgow and Rustico, to the Rev. Peter Jackson of Lorneville, N. B., was presented by Rev. David Colburn of Emerald Interim moderator of the Cavendish Session, and was sustained as a regular gospel call. In case of Mr. Jackson's acceptance, provisional arrangements were made for his induction. The date agreed on for the service is Wed. Feb. 16 at 2 p. m. and the place, the Cavendish Church, Mr. Boothroyd, to preside, Mr. Bagsher to conduct public worship, Dr. Saint to address the Minister and Mr. Aitken the people. The charge is being a new manse at Cavendish and good days ahead for that historic congregation are earnestly sought for and expected.

The former Methodist circuit of Vernon River and Cherry Valley and the former Presbyterian congregation of Orwell Head and St. Andrew's were, on the unanimous desire and consent of the people of the four sections, united into one pastoral charge to take effect July 1st this year. The Rev. Geo. A. Grant now in charge of the Orwell congregation magnanimously offered to retire to pave the way for union and hearty appreciation of his action was enthusiastically voiced by his brethren in the Presbytery. In the meantime until July 1st, Mr. Grant will be in charge of both fields.

Rev. Dr. McLean, United Church Evangelist, who is now conducting special services in Valleyfield and adjoining districts, was introduced to Presbytery and heard in a brief speech full of optimism.

Rev. E. Lockhart, chairman of the committee on Maintenance and Extension submitted a minute report of the condition of that Fund in the Presbytery to date. Last year the congregations of this Presbytery contributed \$33,909 for the year ending March 31st, next the amount asked for is \$31,900. Some congregations are unfortunately not coming up to their allocation very rapidly and unless every church member does his best the fund will be short \$1,000 or more and the course of Christ in our land and overseas suffer to that extent it was decided to memorialize the leading congregations in this matter.

Messrs. S. B. Profit, Hatfield Dymond and R. C. Wright students in divinity at Halifax were recommended for ordination at the next meeting of conference on condition that they receive their diplomas from the Theological College this spring. The committee appointed to confer with Rev. Mr. Tattine of O'Leary who had intimated to Presbytery his wish to lay down his charge on account of ill health, reported that after consulting with Mr. Tattine they agreed to accept his resignation which Presbytery has accepted. The committee were assisting the congregation to secure Sabbath supply and to find a suitable man to take up the work of the Charge. A resolution of sympathy with Mr. Tattine in his illness was heartily adopted.

Messrs. Hunter and Oulton, lay representatives from the congregation of Alberton submitted to the court a resolution of that pastoral charge passed at a large and enthusiastic meeting of the members thereof, petitioning Presbytery to confirm Rev. A. S. Weil, now serving them as minister, in the pastorate of the congregation. This Presbytery agreed to do and added Mr. Weil's name to the roll.

A strong resolution was adopted approving of the attitude of the P. E. I. Ministerial Association in the matter of Temperance and Prohibition and reaffirming the pronouncements of the higher courts of the church relative to the liquor evil and promising support to the government and officers of the law in enforcement of the present Prohibition statute.

Rev. T. A. Wilson of Covehead reported for the church Property Committee explaining and commenting upon the finding of W. E. Bentley, Esq., K. C., as one of the Commissioners appointed to solve problems of the Church union controversy created.
