## ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The Next Meeting to Be  
Held in Souris—Other  
Important Business.

KENSINGTON, Aug. 17—(Special)—

An enjoyable meeting was held in the  
Hall last night which was largely at-  
tended. Mr. F. S. Jost, P. H. C. R.,  
presided. An address of welcome was  
given by Mr. John Anderson which  
was responded to by Mr. J. M. Clark,  
H. C. R. The remainder of the pro-  
gramme consisted of a recitation by  
Dr. Dougherty and a song by Mr. M.  
Lamont which of course was exc. rad.  
Excellent addresses by Mr. H. A. Collins,  
Sup. Treas., and Ray. J. M. Withy-  
combe.

The High Court of Foresters of P. E.  
Island continued its deliberations today  
at Kensington, the first session opening  
at 9 o'clock with the H. C. R., J. M.  
Clark presiding. The various com-  
mittees submitted their reports. Several  
changes were made in the bye-laws of  
the High Court, viz: Payment of \$2.00  
per day to the members of the High  
Standing Com. and the High Auditors  
while on duty, instead of \$3.00 and  
\$1.50 as heretofore. The charter fee  
for each subordinate court is reduced  
from \$5.00 to \$2.50 for applicants tak-  
ing one thousand dollars or more mor-  
tuary benefit, and to \$1.50 for applicants  
taking less than \$1000.00 and \$1.00  
for companion courts.

The question of endowing a Foresters'  
Ward in the P. E. Island Hospital  
occupied a good part of the afternoon's  
session, and elicited considerable dis-  
cussion. It was finally decided to ac-  
cept the offer of the P. E. Island Hos-  
pital—namely to furnish a free bed in  
that institution for one year for the use  
of Foresters, receiving therefore the  
sum of two hundred dollars. It was  
also decided that the full amount of two  
hundred dollars be paid out of the funds  
of the High Court.

## McKINLEY REPLIES

To Mrs. Barker of the  
National W. C. T. U.

## LETTER SATISFACTORY.

It is Probable That his Port-  
rait Will not be Used  
Liquor Ads.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15—Mrs. Helen M.

Barker, treasurer of the National  
Woman's Christian Temperance Union,  
received a letter to-day from President  
McKinley in reply to one she sent him  
three weeks ago informing him that his  
name and portrait, together with the  
American flag, were being used to ad-  
vertise a brand of whiskey. So long  
had been the delay that Mrs. Barker  
had almost despaired of getting an an-  
swer to her communication, but the  
nature of the reply causes her great  
satisfaction.

The letter, signed by George B.  
Cornejo, acting private secretary to  
the President, apologizes for the delay  
in replying to Mrs. Barker's communi-  
cation, and says that this delay was  
caused by 'the desire to institute some  
inquiry into the subject to which you  
refer.' The letter goes on to say that  
'it is impracticable to take notice of all  
public statements and advertising de-  
vices,' notwithstanding the fact that  
embarrassment and objectionable ac-  
tions are the frequent result of allowing  
such things full swing. The President  
then assures Mrs. Barker of his inter-  
ests in appreciation of her efforts,  
and concludes by trusting that the out-  
come will be satisfactory.

Mrs. Barker regards this letter as  
evidence that the President is about to  
take, if he has not already taken, ac-  
tion to prevent the use of his name and  
the Stars and Stripes in the liquor ad-  
vertisements.

## THE RACES AT TRYON.

Witnessed by a Large Gathering of People—  
Races not Finished.

CAPE TRAVERSE, Aug. 17—(Special)  
—An exciting race took place today at  
Tryon. In the thirty-four class Park-  
wood won the first heat. Fully one  
thousand people witnessed the races.  
Representatives from Charlottetown  
and Summerside were present. The  
races are not finished.

It was decided by a unanimous vote  
of the High Court that the next Annual  
Session be held in Souris.

A vote of thanks was tendered H. A.  
Collins, Sup. Sec. for his attendance at  
the session and for his kindly as-  
sistance among different Courts visited  
by him during his stay on the Island.  
Mr. Collins responded in his own  
imitable style and announcing his  
intention to return to Toronto Saturday  
morning and bade adieu to the Brethren  
Court adjourned.

## BY FAST STEAMERS.

Premier of Prince Edward Island Arranges  
For a Direct Service Between Charlottetown  
and Liverpool.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 16.—Hon. Don-  
ald Farquharson, Premier of Prince Ed-  
ward Island, is in Ottawa arranging with  
the Minister of Marine for the establish-  
ment of a direct steamship ser-  
vice between Charlottetown and  
Liverpool. The contract, which is  
said to be as good as closed, pro-  
vides for fortnightly sailings from the  
Island by steamships of about 4,000 tons  
to be equipped with cold storage for the  
transportation of butter, cheese and  
other perishable freight, the service to  
commence about the 6th of Septem-  
ber. The Subsidy voted by Parliament  
last session for this service was \$7,000.  
It will give Island shippers the advan-  
tage of cold storage accommodation at  
freight rates as low as prevail from  
Montreal.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson estimates that  
with the enhanced output of dairy pro-  
duce and excellent yield of crops in  
general this year sufficient will be  
offered for export to give the steamer  
a full cargo each trip. The vessel will,  
of course, have the option of taking  
cargo to and from Montreal so long as  
the requirements of the Island trade  
are amply met.

The lobster catch of Prince Edward  
Island, the Premier says, has been a  
fairly satisfactory one this season. He  
declined to discuss the new regulations  
except to say that the reduction in size  
was imperative.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson will leave for  
home to-morrow, and will probably be  
accompanied by Sir Louis Davies, who  
will make the trip to Prince Edward  
Island to recuperate after the arduous  
work of the session.
