## German Offensive In Russia Makes Some Progress

### Two Villages Taken Despite Heavy Losses

Russians Report At Least 13,000 Germans Killed In Two Days.

LONDON, July 7—(Wednesday)—(AP)—The big German offensive against Central Russia drove into two populated places near Belgorod at the southern anchor of the 165-mile front Tuesday despite terrific losses which mounted to at least 13,000 German dead in two days of fierce fighting, the Russians announced today.

### India Still Faces Invasion Threat

### Fighter Sweeps Over France

LONDON, July 6—(CP)—R.A.F. and R.C.A.F. fighters on sweeps over Northern France and along the French coast from Dieppe to Dunkerque knocked down seven German planes today three of which were bagged by R.A.F. Spitfires. Meanwhile, German reports of British bombing raids over Berlin last night remained unconfirmed.
