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General Crerar Expresses Faith in "Coming Victory"

(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—In a New Year's message, sent to Canada and the United States, Gen. D. H. G. Crerar today referred to "our conviction of approaching victory" and declared there was "no doubt in the mind of any one of us that the Nazi regime and its supporters must be eliminated."

I have been asked to send this New Year's message to the people of Canada and the United States. I am glad to do so. I shall not speak of what Army has accomplished. You can judge for yourself. The small, however, mention to you some of the thoughts that are in the minds of Canadian soldiers in spare moments at this particular time. First of all we are all resolved to get on with the business of beating the Boche and finishing off this war completely and convincingly in a minimum of time. We know quite definitely that the final result will be a complete and final victory over the Axis powers. We know that the individual soldier is constantly showing himself capable of the greatest individual sacrifice. Those of us who return to Canada hope to bring that spirit back and with the inspiration it affords, to make the final result an even better one for all to live in.

Finally, on behalf of all ranks I send you our conviction that the approaching victory is now that the fighting will be fierce. We are very confident that the final result will be a complete and final victory over the Axis powers. We know that the individual soldier is constantly showing himself capable of the greatest individual sacrifice. Those of us who return to Canada hope to bring that spirit back and with the inspiration it affords, to make the final result an even better one for all to live in.

Dealing In Used Cars

More effective control over the marketing of used cars must ensure equitable distribution at fair prices has been announced by the Ontario Motor Vehicle Dealers' Association in an order effective immediately. The order establishes two sets of ceiling prices for used cars. The first set applies to cars sold by dealers. The second set applies to cars sold by private individuals. The order also provides for the licensing of all used cars. The order is intended to protect the public and to ensure that used cars are sold at fair prices. The order also provides for the licensing of all used cars.

All persons carrying on a business of buying or selling used cars in Ontario on or after January 1, 1945, and who do not presently have a license, must apply to the nearest Motor Vehicle Dealers' Association office for a license. The license is valid for one year. The license fee is \$10.00. The license also provides for the licensing of all used cars.

On every sale of a used car, whether by a dealer or a private individual, a statement of sale signed by both buyer and seller with a witness to each signature must be completed in triplicate. A signed copy together with any certificate of title must be sent to the seller at the nearest Prices Board Office within four days of the date of sale.
