NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Smashing defeat of a revamped Harvard team at the hands of tiny Geneva provided a stunning inaugural of the Big Three season as the last of the major eastern events swung into the pigskin parade Saturday.

The 16 to 7 victory of the Pennsylvanians, strangely reminiscent of the day five years ago, when "Bo" McMillan led his band of Centre College colonels to equal glory, marked the first defeat on the opening day of the season in the history of Harvard football. But in

his place on the stadium turf, the famous "Bo" now coach of the Geneva squad, sent a towering high-kick, "Mac" Flehiken to ride the Harvard line apart, skirt the ends, and toss passes.

500 Troops Mowed Down at Gates Of Wu Chang

HANKOW, Oct. 5.—About 500 Northern troops who attempted to sortie from the besieged city of Wu Chang today in an attempt to recapture Pagoda Hill from the Cantonese were mowed down by the South owners, who used machine guns.

The Northerners attempted to return to Wu Chang and found the city's gates closed against them. It is believed all were killed. The Northern troops within Wu Chang, who have been holding it for some time, are growing desperate. While the Cantonese without have adopted the embargo method of besieging the city the civilian population is starving. Some days ago the food supply was reported exhausted for all civilians except foreigners, and now the military is said to be without both food and fuel.

Haines also drove in two runs with a homer in the fourth inning. Southworth scored the final run in the fifth inning.

Lunenburg Skipper Willing To Take Boat To Gloucester

HALIFAX, Oct. 5.—Prospects of a Nova Scotia fishing vessel starting with the Columbia and Henry Ford in the schooner race to be held off Gloucester, brightened considerably today when it was stated that the necessary money was likely to be forthcoming to fit the Halifax owned schooner Halgionian as a competitor.

William J. Ross, designer of the Halgionian and many other fast sailing vessels, and who is keenly interested in having the Halgionian enter in the Gloucester race, went to Lunenburg today to consult with Captain Crouse, skipper of the local boat and reported that the latter was willing to take the vessel to Gloucester provided she would be ready in time. A new mainsail will be necessary together with considerable painting and two days before the races are scheduled, which would allow a short margin of time for the trip up. It is possible that a postponement would have to be requested if the Halgionian were to compete.

Every Piece of Plane Salvaged At Air Post

DAYTON, O., Oct. 5.—One of the busiest and most important departments of the Army Air Service at McCook field here in the salvage department.

When an airplane becomes unsafe for flying or is damaged in an accident to an extent that makes it unsafe to go to the salvage department. Every part, every piece of material that holds the aircraft in place of future service is taken from the ship, inspected and either used again or sold. The discarded ship is stripped of every thing that is valuable and only a husk remains.

Those mechanical and other parts that are believed to be of further service undergo the same inspection as new parts and if they pass are put back in stock. The miscellaneous metal scraps are sold as junk.

1,323 BUSHELS OF CANADIAN GRAIN SHIPPED THROUGH U. S. PORTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Grain exports last week from the United States were 7,447,000 bushels against 3,850,000 bushels the week before. Canadian grain exported from the United States ports last week was 1,323,000 bushels against 1,068,000 the week before, while exports of North American wheat flour were 314,000 barrels against 201,000 barrels.
