## MOCK PARLIAMENT

On Wednesday afternoon, the St. Thomas Literary and Debating Society of St. Dunstan's College, held its first meeting since the holidays. President Jos W. McDonald was in the chair, and after all the regular business had been attended to, the meeting resolved into a Mock Parliament.

This was the first meeting this year under this form, and the House was opened with all due ceremonials. The Governor General, Rev A. B. MacDonald, was escorted into the House at 2.30 and took his seat on the Throne. Hon W. W. Hughes was approved of as speaker, and His Excellency, after granting every ancient right and privilege, opened the House. The Speech from the Throne, contained some important measures, not the least of which is the Canadian naval question, and the establishment of a suitable Conciliation Board to settle all labor disputes. The draft address in reply to His Excellency, was moved by Hon Jos

C. McDonald in an eloquent speech and was seconded by Hon Jos Rooney.

Honorable Jos W. McDonald, Premier, announced his cabinet as follows.

Hon Owen Kiggins, Postmaster General; Hon William Bowlen, Minister of Railways and Canals; Hon Leo Herrell, Minister of Agriculture; Hon A. Desrosiers, Minister Militia and Defence; Hon A. Turgence, Minister of Trade and Commerce; Hon Stephen McDonald, Minister of Interior; Hon Gerald McCarty, Minister of Marine and Fisheries; Hon Russel Smith, Minister of Finance; Hon Joseph McKenzie, Minister of Public Works.

Hon Jas A. Murphy, leader of the Opposition, then addressed the House. He noted many changes in the seats this year, and remarked on the great amount of talent that the House now possessed, and he begged both parties to use discretion, and employ this talent for the best interests of the country. Hon Jos W. McDonald spoke on the Speech from the Throne and outlined the policy of the Government party. He was followed by Hon Stephen McDonald, who supported his statements and gave notice that a bill would be brought.

fic may be easily followed the route of Canada's All-Red route, the Grand Trunk Pacific, by means of which millions of square miles of new grain-producing territory are being opened up to the settler. The work not only affords a graphic idea of the vastness of the great Dominion, but also gives an impressive idea of the 3000 miles of new roads. The preparation of the map was a delicate task, since it is the largest piece of ceramic work that has ever been attempted. It required the combined services of eight expert operators continuously for five months, and it is one of the most costly reproductions of a map that has ever been undertaken. In its manufacture the great difficulty was to obtain a result which would be quite legible in day light and which would be sufficiently transparent to allow of illumination by means of twenty-four 25-candle power lamps by night. The delicate blending of the various tints, the definition of the finest hair-like lines, and the distinctness of the names renders it a work of artistic and educational value. Owing to its fragile character and large size combined with its great weight of one ton three hundredweights, its transport from Birmingham, where it was manufactured, to London had to be carried out by special means.—"Canada," London, Dec. 4, 1909.
