NOVA SCOTIANS Are Aware Of War Needs

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On a brief speaking tour of the Maritimes in support of the coming Fifth Victory Loan, Mr. Aulic tomorrow will address a combined meeting of service clubs and tomorrow night will address a group of workers. Saturday he leaves for Kentville to deliver a speech in the heart of his federal constituency, and then returns here before going back to Ottawa Sunday.

The War Finance Committee is asking \$22,000,000 of the loan total of \$1,200,000,000 of the ordinary citizen, he said, because there must be a reduction in the demand for consumer goods and the means to purchase them unless disastrous inflation is to follow.

Large corporations are not making huge profits out of the war, he said, but the increase in spending power has become proportionately far greater in the lower income brackets.
