IN MEMORIAM

STANISLAUS DOIRON

Residents of Rocky Point and vicinity were saddened on Thursday, April 28th, by receiving the news of the passing of Mr. Stanislaus Doiron, the oldest and certainly one of the most highly respected citizens of that community.

Although having reached the advanced age of eighty eight, the deceased was in comparatively good health, helping with the lighter chores of the farm until a short time before his death. He was confined to bed for only two weeks.

The late Mr. Doiron together with his wife the former Sophia Pineau, who predeceased him seventeen years ago, moved from Hope River to Rocky Point several years ago, where, together with his son Joseph and family, he was successfully engaged in farming.

Being of a deeply religious nature, and possessed of a truly Christian spirit, the late Mr. Doiron truly "lived" his religion, being ever ready and willing to co-operate heartily in any church or community endeavor, and to assist all who needed his help in any way. In times of sickness, or trouble everyone could be assured of his visits and his desire to lighten each one's burden in any way possible.

He was a devout Catholic and never, except for a serious reason, was his place vacant during Sunday Mass at St. Martin's Church, South Shore, illness during which he was tenderly cared for by his son Joseph, and his daughter-in-law, also by his grandson and wife he did not complain, rather he accepted his sickness and death with fortitude, strengthened by the sacraments and last rites of his Holy Church, administered to him by Rev. Fr. Baldwin C. S.S. R. and Rev. Fr. Hennessey, C.S.S.R., who visited him during his last days on earth.

Besides his son Joseph, Mr. Doiron leaves to mourn one daughter, Mrs. Joseph Doucette, Charlotetown, his sister, Mrs. Judith Pineau, Hope River; also nine grandchildren and twenty great grandchildren.

The funeral which was well attended despite the poor condition of the weather, was held Saturday, April 30th, morning from his late residence to St. Martin's Church, where Requiem High Mass was also conducted, the ceremony at the grave where the remains were tenderly laid to rest.

The pallbearers were Bruce Smith, Stanley Taylor, Wellington Murphy, Alex. MacLean, Angus Doiron, Joseph Gaudet.
