INTERESTING DECISION—A good deal of interest has been taken in the case of McDonald v. McMaisters, in which the decision of the full court of the Province, in favour of the plaintiff, was appealed from to the Supreme Court of Canada. Yesterday it was learned that the Supreme Court had dismissed the appeal, with costs. Mr. Gilbert Gaudet, K. C., represented McDonald, and Messrs. D. A. McKinnon, K. C., and J. J. Johnston, K. C., McMaisters.

BODY FOUND.—The Guardian has been informed by a resident of North Lake that the body of a man was picked up on the North Shore, about one mile west of Matthew and McLean's lobster factory, on Nov. 11. From the appearance of the body it must have been in the water for considerable time. The flesh from the face was completely gone and it was with much difficulty the body could be handled. Dr. A. A. McLean, coroner for Kings County, was notified by telephone and after ascertaining that there was no way of identifying the body he gave instructions to the finder to have it buried. The body was that of a large man, 6 feet tall, the clothing consisted of a linder, a thin dark sweater with green stripes, a pair of drawers and one shoe. Acting on the advice of the people in the vicinity the body was interred in an old burying ground at North Lake, known as the Red Bank burying ground, where several sailors and inhabitants of North Lake have already been buried.

A BURGLARY.—The store formerly conducted by J. J. Gay & Sons in the Market Building and now owned by the Campbell brothers, was broken into on Friday night, and \$200 in cash stolen from the safe.
