## FAITHFUL WARNINGS.

The Liberal Government at Ottawa is receiving these days many warnings from disinterested friends that the multiplication of scandals in connection with the public service is very like what the Liberals when in opposition condemned in the Government of that day. How in the old days they condemned extravagance, and the profligate of public servants in public contracts! If we could imagine a Conservative Government now in power and doing the same things that are done by the Laurier Government, what would a Liberal Opposition be saying?

The Toronto News is by no means unfriendly to the party in power. Its editor Mr. Williston, was for years the editor of the Toronto Globe. He was the eulogistic biographer of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Yet The News now finds it a duty to call the Administration to account for the scandals that have developed in connection with immigration, public works, railways, the Northwest, and the lavish expenditure apparent on every hand. Other independent journals throughout the Dominion are doing the same, and speaking plainly and the few independent members in Parliament have from time to time sounded their notes of warning. Will these warnings be heeded?

The News says: "We have no love for the discredited Conservative leaders of 1896, nor no malice against the discredited Liberal leaders of today. But we have a belief, we think it laudable though perhaps old-fashioned, that a man who steals or permits stealing from the public chest is a candidate for penitentiary. Moreover, we have another old-fashioned idea, that a solemn promise is as binding on a Government as on an individual. The Laurier Government promised honest and economical administration. It has permitted instead, graft and reckless extravagance."

Senator David of Montreal has a plan of Senate reform. He would have one third appointed by the Dominion, as now, one third chosen by the provinces and one third by the universities and colleges.

The Newfoundland trade returns show that in seven years the volume of trade of the Colony has increased from \$13 to 21 millions. During the same time the imports from Canada have increased 100 per cent; from the United States 42 per cent, and from Great Britain 37 per cent.

The death of Gabriel Dumont is announced, and a few days later that of Dame Riel, mother of the notorious Louis Riel. Their deaths recall the rebellion of 1885 in the Northwest in which Lamont and Riel took a leading part and for which the latter was hanged.

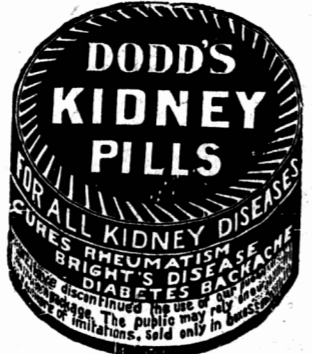
Commissioner Cumiskey has replied to the letter of Contractor Campbell, setting forth that the Government could not undertake to supply watchmen to guard the contractor's plant and material, and especially while the Government have no control of the bridge. In the meantime the engineer in charge, Mr. Laurence, has given public notice that the bridge will be closed to traffic during the progress of the work of painting the superstructure and macadamising the approaches.

San Francisco before the earthquake had 4,000 saloons. It was found necessary at the time of the calamity to close them all and absolutely prohibit the traffic. This prompt action was the salvation of the city from crime and violence. Here in Prince Edward Island we believe that what was good for San Francisco in the hour of her calamity is good for any community in its every day life. We did not wait for an earthquake.

Saint John is said to have more unlicensed, unlicensed and useless dogs than almost any city of its size, and one of its canines went mad a day or two ago, causing no small sensation. Its plucky owner held the animal for an hour till help came when its throat was cut, fortunately before it had bitten any one. Rabies is rare in our northern latitudes, especially at this season of the year, but what has happened in St. John might occur in other Canadian cities, possibly even in Charlottetown.

A number of writers remark upon the close parallel that exists between the condition of Russia now and that of France in the time of Louis XVI. Louis consented to calling together of the Constituent Assembly under pressure as the Czar has consented to the summoning of the Duma; Louis resisted the demands of his Parliament and it deposed and decapitated him. That was nearly 120 years ago. It is possible that history may repeat itself by extending the bloody and revolutionary parallel. The first French Parliament showed no disposition to be content with the shadow of authority and we have seen how resolute the Russian Parliament is along the same line. We do not know as yet whether the Czar sees the gravity of his present peril as all the civilized world seems to see it.

There is something sadly pathetic in the case of those two little ones who have so strangely disappeared, just across the Straits in the Parish of Bayfield. One was but five, the other only three years old. All children love flowers. These little ones when last seen were in search of violets. Then followed the disappearance, the awful suspense, the eager search of sympathizing hundreds continued day and night, first in the hope of rescuing, and since in the hope of finding the bodies of the lost ones. Absolutely no trace seems to have been found of them down to the date of this writing, although every foot of ground over which children of such tender years could have lived to travel has been apparently searched with scrupulous care. The tragedy is one which must appeal to every sympathetic heart.

Probably no one really believes that the persons recently arrested in connection with the death of Mr. McPhee at Orwell were guilty of the intention to kill or to harm the deceased. The general feeling seems to be that their arrest under the circumstances was a mistake and a hardship. But obviously this grew out of the entire inadequacy of the coroner's investigation. It was wanting in almost every feature that should characterize a judicial inquiry in case of sudden death. The examination of the head of the deceased made while the body lay in the coffin throws absolutely no light upon the cause of death. The information thus obtained did not exclude any one of a dozen possible causes of death, as by shock, or violence, or poison. Such an inquiry and verdict were not calculated to allay public suspicion but rather to arouse it. This brings up the question of coroner's inquests in general, and the qualification of coroners. Too many of the inquests held are so wanting in the essentials of what should characterize an investigation into the cause of death as to be utterly useless, if not worse.
