**THE ARANMORE.**—The S. S. Aranmore arrived in port from Pictou at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. She brought aboard 25 passengers and a large cargo, consisting principally of flour and meal. She sails for Pictou at 7 o'clock this morning.

**HOME FOR BURIAL.**—The remains of the late Leo Griffith, aged 15 years, a pupil of the School for Deaf and Dumb, Halifax, arrived by the Aranmore yesterday and were forwarded to his late home at South Shore for interment. Heart trouble was the cause of death.

**A PATRIOTIC FAMILY.**—Mr. John Daniel Finlayson, of Peakes Station, has enlisted for service overseas in the Royal Navy. He leaves this morning en route to England. His brother William left here on March 14th last for England having been also accepted for the navy. He is attached to H. M. S. Victoria to which ship John is very anxious to be attached in order to be with his brother. It is only a short time ago since the sad news was received that a younger brother of these patriotic boys met death at the battle of Vimy Ridge.

**TRACKMEN'S MEETING.**—The Brotherhood of Railway Trackmen held their regular quarterly meeting in the Charlottetown Railway Assembly Hall on Wednesday evening. There was a large attendance. The trackmen expressed great satisfaction over the recent increase of thirty cents per day which had been made to their pay.

**GUTHRIE GETS \$2,000.**—Lieut. Colonel Percy A. Guthrie left Boston Tuesday for Valcartier, where he will undertake the active training of his men. He enlisted and forwarded to Canada eight hundred recruits, bringing the 236th New Brunswick Kilties up to 1,300 men or about 200 over-strength. Before leaving Boston, the allied English, Scottish and Irish societies presented the gallant O. C. of the 236th with \$2,000 in cash for the battalion fund.

**PYTHIAN CONVENTION.**—The Knights of Pythias from all parts of the Maritime Provinces will gather in Sydney on the third Tuesday in August for the annual session of the Grand Lodge. Delegates from nearly every lodge are expected to attend one of the most important sessions in years is anticipated. This will be the first occasion upon which the Grand Lodge of the Knights of Pythias has ever met in Cape Breton, an invitation having been extended to the knights last year by ex-Mayor W. A. Richardson and heartily accepted. It is already known that a large delegation of New Brunswick knights and some from P. E. Island contemplate attending the Grand Lodge while the irrepressible Dokays will be on hand in all their glory.

**RE-VISITING HIS ISLAND HOME.**—Mr. and Mrs. Charles Molyneux, of Lawrence, Mass., are visiting Charlottetown, Mr. Molyneux's former home. It is thirty-five years ago since he left here. Needless to say, he sees many changes in that time. Before leaving Charlottetown Mr. Molyneux conducted a photograph studio on Queen Street, and later took up carpenter work in its various branches. He has been out to visit his old homestead—the Doller farm on the Malpeque Road and the change in that section is surprising since he saw it thirty-five years ago. At that time dense woods hid all the surrounding country where today there is clear land and fine farmsteads on every hand. Town and country show a vast improvement since Mr. Molyneux last set foot on his native soil. Mr. Molyneux carries an interesting souvenir, a railway ticket which he purchased when leaving the island at that time. It was to carry him from Pictou Landing to Truro. The conductor punched the ticket, but it was never collected. Mr. and Mrs. Molyneux expect to remain on the island for a couple of months.

**VERDICT GIVEN.**—In the case of Major Schurman vs. the trustees of St. James' Church, Charlottetown, which has been before Mr. Justice Hazard and the jury of the Supreme Court, Summerside, for the past five days, a verdict was rendered for the plaintiff for \$1,321. Mr. Schurman was engaged by the trustees to remodel the manse. The trustees claim that the contract price was \$3,786, and they gave in evidence, a resolution passed by the congregation authorizing them to spend that amount. Mr. Schurman, on the other hand, contended that there was no contract and that he was entitled to receive not only that amount, but the total amount that he had expended in labour and material, amounting to something over \$5,000. A number of witnesses were examined, including Rev. Dr. Fullerton, W. K. Rogers, of Charlottetown, chairman of the trustees, and W. A. Stewart. It is understood that the case will be appealed. ### S. S. APPAM OWNERS LOST THEIR SUIT ON PERISHABLE CARGO

NEW YORK—On the ground that submission to capture a ship constitutes abandonment of the cargo entrusted to it, the federal court, was dismissed the suit of the owners of the British steamship Appam to recover as freight money the proceeds of sale of her perishable cargo.

The Appam was captured last February off the Canary Islands, while bound from British West Africa for England, by the German raider Mowe. Her prize crew subsequently brought her into Hampton Roads, Va., where she was returned to the British owners by the supreme court which held that the title of the capture was forfeited by a breach of American neutrality in over-staying the time allowed a belligerent in a port in this country as a neutral.

**Mook Loaf Cake**  
This cake, which grows better by keeping, is very economical. It requires no eggs and a substitute for butter may be used. Mix with one cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of shortening (either butter or lard), add one cupful of milk or coffee and two and one-half cupfuls of flour into which one and one-half teaspoonfuls of baking powder have been sifted. Finally, stir in one cupful of raisins and a small piece of citron chopped.
