

Cleveland Indians Win First Doubleheader Of Current Baseball Season

Pyle In Easy Victory Over Pete Zaduk

Cleveland Indians yesterday (Monday) won their first American League doubleheader of the season and their fifth game in their last six starts by defeating St. Louis Browns 2-1 and 5-0 before 33,093 fans.

Rookie Mike Garcia hurled six-hit ball for his third victory in the nightcap after Gene Bearden limited the Browns to five safeties in the 12-inning opener. Ned Garver and Cliff Fanning sustained the losses.

Two unearned runs on veteran shortstop Luke Appling's ninth inning error let Detroit take the opener of a holiday doubleheader 3-2, but Chicago White Sox tapped Hal Newhouser for a 2-1 victory in the nightcap behind the six-hit hurling of Lefty Bill Wright.

Boston Red Sox moved back in second place by whipping Philadelphia Athletics 10-2 in the opener, and coming from behind for a 4-3 decision in the closing contest, which was decided by a lusty Ted Williams homer.

Williams lashed his game-winning blow with Johnny Pesky on base in the eighth inning to the great delight of 26,133, the largest Fenway Park crowd of the season.

New York Yankees blasted four Washington pitchers for 20 hits and 13-3 victory in the second game of a doubleheader to earn a split with the Senators.

Washington won the first game 6-2 before an overflow throng of 23,081, largest crowd to attend a baseball game here since 1941.

Canadian Challenges British Heavyweight

LONDON, May 30 (CP) — A Canadian challenge today was thrown into the British heavy-weight boxing ring for the first time in many a year.

Vern Escoc, 25-year-old Canadian heavyweight champion from Toronto, wants an Empire title scrap. He seeks to fight the winner of the bout next Thursday in London between Bruce Woodcock and Freddie Mills.

The British Boxing Board of Control has agreed to recognize any such fight as for the Empire crown, if Escoc can make a deal. Whether Woodcock or Mills will take up the challenge remains to be seen. Mills, recognized here as light heavyweight champion of the world, is challenging Woodcock as European and Empire heavyweight champion. The winner is to meet Lee Savold of New Jersey in London next September in a bout billed as for the world heavyweight title.

No Canadian heavyweight has had any success in British rings since Larry Gains of Toronto held the Empire crown in the early '30s. But Harry Levene, who represents Escoc in London, is confident the Canadian will get a fight, either before or after the Savold tilt.

The British Boxing Board of Control said the Escoc challenge has been received and considered. While the board has agreed to recognize any fight by an Empire boxer with the winner of the June 2 bout as an Empire title fight, it emphasized that this does not mean the board considers Escoc the only or even the leading contender.

Chicago And Pittsburgh Divide Twin Bill Before Biggest Crowd Of Season

The National League's tall-order, Chicago and Pittsburgh, yesterday (Monday) divided a doubleheader before 38,089, the biggest Forbes Field crowd of the year. The Cubs grabbed the opener 6-4 and Pittsburgh took the nightcap 8-6.

Starting pitcher Rip Sewell of Pittsburgh suffered an injured thumb in the first game, and three other hurlers failed to stop the Cubs. In the second game, Ralph Kiner hit his 11th homer of the year for the Bucs. Kiner's homer, along with a triple in the first game extended his consecutive hitting streak to 12 games.

Philadelphia Phillies and Boston Braves split a doubleheader the Phillies winning the nightcap 6-5 in 10 innings after the Braves won the opener 7-3 before a Memorial Day crowd of 21,933.

After losing the opener of a doubleheader to Brooklyn, 2-1, when Jackie Robinson cracked a 13th-inning home run, New York Giants, sparked by homers by Johnny Mize and Whitey Lockman, bounced back to win the second game, 7-4.

A crowd of 53,053 watched the standoff, which left the two teams still in a three-way tie with Boston Braves for first place in the National League.

St. Louis Cardinals took full advantage of ineffective work by Cincinnati pitchers to sweep doubleheader, 8-6 and 9-2, before a crowd of 29,000.

Howie Pollet stopped the Reds with five hits in the second game after the Cards had rallied to wipe out a five-run deficit in the opener.
