

Contract Let For New Summerside Hospital

At the annual meeting of the Prince County Hospital held last night in the Town Hall, Summerside, Mr. W. E. Darby, K. C. president of the board in his report announced that the contract for the construction of the new hospital had been awarded to Poulson Maritimes Ltd. with headquarters at Halifax who tendered for the amount of \$35,000.00, fixed fee for contractor's services. Mr. Darby's report further gave the probable cost of the new institution at \$700,000.

The annual meeting was very largely attended by the directors from the entire County. Mr. W. E. Darby was unanimously re-elected president for the coming year and Mr. L. Bradshaw as vice-president.

In the election for directors the following were re-elected: From Summerside, W. G. Hogg, W. M. Mellich, Morley Bell, Hazen Phillips, Mr. J. Hale Strong was elected to replace the late W. J. Lidstone. Mr. George Wilkinson of Springhill West and Austin Scales of Pictou were appointed as directors for their various districts.

Excellent reports were handed in by the Ladies Aid of the Hospital and the Octo Club.

In his review of the year's work Mr. Darby pointed out that recent years have not been very happy ones from the standpoint of hospital administration. Shortage of trained nurses has made it difficult to maintain adequate personnel and rising costs of materials and supplies had added to the difficulty. The report conveyed to the meeting a clear idea of the amazing increase in the hospital has had over a period of years and the difficulties encountered in handling this increased volume of business in a small institution with a normal capacity of 55 beds. This condition, he learned, had been growing steadily worse and it was due to this that the board felt it imperative to construct the new hospital.

Mr. Darby explained the three ways under which construction could proceed. First by contract

Health League Concludes Sessions

MONTREAL, June 19—(CP)—The broad fields of immunization and industrial health came in for discussion today at the third and concluding day of the 28th annual convention of the Health League of Canada which went on record as approving Canada-wide adoption of pre-marriage medical tests. The resolution regarding pre-marriage medical examination, including a test for syphilis, was put forward by Dr. Gordon Bates of Toronto, general director of the League, who noted that Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Prince Edward Island have such a law and in British Columbia the legislation only awaits enactment. Other resolutions promised the League's support to all health agencies in Canada looking to improvement of the people's health; congratulated the Federal Health Department on its decision to call a national conference on rheumatism; and complimented Dominion, Provincial and municipal health authorities on their cooperation with the League in regard to immunization and national health week plans.

Expect Floods To Have Small Effect On U. S. Farm Yield

WASHINGTON, June 19—(AP)—Midwestern floods have destroyed thousands of acres of early-planted crops but their total effect on the United States' food supply is expected to be relatively small. Agriculture Department officials are still optimistic over prospects of another bumper output of farm products. They said today that figures probably not equal to last year's record but still far above pre-war levels. The largest wheat crop on record is virtually assured.

Drew Fires Grit Members Of Commission

TORONTO, June 18—(CP)—The Ontario Government's action today dismissing the three Ontario members of the Niagara Falls Bridge Commission left unanswered the main question in the now-famous bell controversy: whether the names of Winston Churchill and Franklin D. Roosevelt would be removed from the main hall of the Carillon installed at the Canadian end of the Rainbow Bridge at Niagara Falls. The three Ontario members of the Commission whose office was ended by a statement from Premier Drew of Ontario are chairman A. J. Haines of Jordan Ont., T. B. McQuesten and Ross Hazstone, both of Hamilton. All three were appointed by the former Hepburn Liberal Government.

Mr. Haines tonight said he understood that his appointment to the Commission was for life, but that he would not contest the Premier's decision. As for the inscription itself, Mr. Haines said it was still undecided whether it would be removed. Below a 10-line verse of praise the words are: "To God's glory and in grateful memory of our nations' leaders Winston Spencer Churchill and Franklin Delano Roosevelt."

Mr. McQuesten said he understood Premier Drew's statement as meaning that the inscription would be retained.

Premier Drew announced in a statement that "to provide continuity of representation in this international commission, the Ontario Provincial Secretary (R. D. Michener) has been appointed a member of the Commission."

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
