With the big bout between Kelly and McNeill on Wednesday last at the Forum and the coming heavy-weight title bout at Kensington between Leslie and Evans all one hears is arguments and talk about fighting.

Of course this all augurs well for the province. At least it has proven a different matter from the old days when the only thing that attracted one's eyes was the fact that all the fans that are taking about the bouts attend on the main floor they are staged there will be no more of any human hops.

Locally the fans are all set up for the appearance of Kelly against McNeill. Various reports of Kelly's progress in his campaign in the States and the success that attended it have all served to make an impression on the minds of the fans. As well as being a crack at the world title, the fans are taking an interest in whether or not he is the first Canadian to reach the heights of the middle-weight game.

But fans in the Western part of the Province are really boxing mad. The date for Evans' title defence with Leslie nears. Evans, is a boy that really came out of obscurity. He was a well known figure around his native city but never did his friends and neighbors have an inkling that he would fight a lick as the saying goes.

There was plenty of surprises mingled with delight when Evans took Leslie into camp in such a decisive manner and you can bet your bottom dollar that on the night of the fight there will be plenty of Evans money flashed in front of anyone who doubts the ability of the Irishman led to repeat his triumph. And while all this goes on Evans continues to lead away quietly and unassuming.

It is probably the most unaffected person in the entire western section of the island but at the same time the most serious with only one thought in mind and that is of retaining his title.

Going further away from home in boxing circles there will be quite a section of former heavy-weight champions at the ringside when Jimmy Braddock defends his title against Joe Louis at Comiskey Park, Chicago, June 22. Sheldon Clark, the big old man will have as his opponent Gene Tunney and Jack Dempsey.

It will probably be this pair's first meeting since the night they were trading punches with each other at Coney Island ten years ago. That was the time of Dave Barry's famous "long count" but probably they will exchange laughing reminiscences about it this time.

Max Schmeling the man who was given the "run around" by Braddock will be on the outside looking in and it would be interesting if one could but see the long-hair's talk with Braddock through the solid Teuton's mind as he watches the warriors wage no action. Jack Sinskey will also be there while Jim Jeffries and Jess Willard, two of the old timers will be interested spectators at the ringside. Quite a gathering and one that will add a certain glamour to the proceedings.

Bill Westwick of the Ottawa Journal has the following on the recent move of the C. A. A. A. to relocate the winners' Monarchs, Juno of champions of the Dominion League of the Amateur Athletic Union, rapidly developing into a gathering of Canada's forgotten men, are back in the news again. With Professor Hart at the helm and the subject given long and serious consideration, the Union has decided to renege on a contract with the Junior hockey champions of Canada.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, N. Y., June 6—New York Giants took over first place in the National League today by pounding three Pittsburgh pitchers for 13 hits and a 9-5 victory over the Pirates.

It was the first time the Cubs had been ousted from the loop lead since May 1.

Cubs Mancuso's homer with two mates abundant in the fourth inning sent the Cubs off to a lead they never relinquished, although they had to call on Carl Hubbell to relieve Hal Schumacher in the ninth and retire the last two Pittsburgh batters.

The feat was the fourth straight for the Cubs and the second in a row they dropped to the Giants.

REDS WALLOP DODGERS
Rockie Johnny Vandermeer hand cutted the Dodgers with seven hits at Brooklyn today as his Cincinnati Reds mates went on a slugging rampage to wallop the Brooklyn 9-2 and even the current series.

Al but two of the Reds hit safely, with Alex Kampouris contributing his ninth homer of the season, with the bases loaded to put the same on ice as early as the third inning.

SPLIT DOUBLE BILL
Chicago's fast traveling Cubs came back to capture the night cap 7-1 from Bees at Boston after they had been set back 7-1 by their old nemesis, Guy Eash, in the opener.

Behind the airtight pitching of Lester Buzan, the Cubs checked up their 10th victory in the last 12 games.

Bush registered his third victory of the season and the first triumph he has hurled against the Cubs in two years.

Empire Ziggy Sears forfeited the second game of a double header between the Cardinals and Phillies to St. Louis 9-0 today for alleged clubby tactics by the Philadelphia club in what appeared to be an attempt to prolong the game until the Sunday curfew would halt the contest before it became legal. Umpire Klem, veteran of the National League who was standing behind Johnson, rushed to the plate and after a few moments' conference with Sears, the latter declared the game forfeited.

Scoring seven runs with a sustained batting attack in the last half of the first inning, "Pomp" Bolger's Cubs captured their first victory in the "Industrial" Baseball League over the weekend by defeating the Bowers 11 to 4.

It mattered little that Elmer Larter's relief pitching from the second inning on kept the winners pretty well in check. The damage had been done with that early assault. Canadiens Show Class In Shutout Win

Rapidly nearing the peak of their form, Junior Canadiens showed a lot of class and ability in their 8-0 shutout victory over the Holy Redeemer Dodgers in a weekend junior league encounter. Playing steadily behind the brilliant three-hit hurling of "Skinny" McKinnon the Canadiens were in the lead 3-0 at the end of the first frame and a brace of tallies in the fourth. Scotty Rankine Wins Marathon
CANTON, N. Y., June 6—(CP) —Headed by the veteran Scotty Rankine of Preston, Ont., Canadians captured four of the first six places in the United States Amateur Athletic Union's 20-kilometre run here Saturday.

Leading from the start in the field of 30, Rankine ran over a hill-and-dale route from Canton to Morley and return, a distance of about 12-1/2 miles, and added a third title to his list. He already holds the United States 15-kilometre championship and the Canadian one mile title.

Rankine covered the distance in one hour, 11 minutes and three seconds compared with one hour, 11 minutes and 18 seconds for Jean Berthelot, second, and last year's victor.

War Admiral Wins Belmont In Record-smashing Display To Annex "Triple Crown"

NEW YORK, June 6—War Admiral, mighty little son of Man O'War, who flashed a record-smashing display of speed Saturday to capture the classic Belmont Stakes with ease and become the fourth three-year-old in thoroughbred history to wear the prized American "triple" crown probably will not race again this season.

Ranger Again Triumphs In "Trial" Race

NEWPORT, R. I., June 6—Unbeaten Ranger continued her triumphal procession Saturday in quest of America's Cup defence nomination by defeating Yankee by a margin of two minutes, five seconds, over a 27.5 mile course in a light wind.

It was Harold S. Vanderbilt's third successive victory, his second at the expense of Gerard B. Lambert's veteran of the 1930 and 1934 international sailing engagements.

Ranger also whipped Chandler Hovey's Rainbow, the boat with which Vanderbilt ended trials to nominate an opponent for T. O. M. Soppin's second British challenger.
