GOOD WORK AGAINST FRAUD.

Against impure and debasing literature, indecent posters, and fraudulent advertising the National Council of Women is doing a good work. There is a committee of the National Council devoted to searching out, exposing and correcting these abuses, and there are like committees in the Local Councils from Sydney to Victoria working along the same lines and in constant touch with the national committee. The Local Council of Charlottetown has its own committee for this object. One of the frauds exposed primarily through the agency of the Toronto Local Council some time ago was an advertisement calling for secretaries for an alleged National Woman's League in which each applicant was encouraged to believe she would receive \$600 a year with travelling expenses, and would be expected to represent the society at the St. Louis Exhibition. After correspondence of the most cordial and friendly character, a bogus cheque is sent for an amount in excess of the cost of the journey, and the promise of a half fare ticket to St. Louis. Many women were entrapped, got their cheques cashed and remitted half of it for tickets which they never received, and afterwards had to make good to the banks which had cashed the bogus cheques the amount which they had received.

Miss Nichol of Toronto, Secretary of the Council Committee on Objectionable Printed Matter, was one who answered the fraudulent advertisement and made a full exposure to the fraud, with names, dates and particulars. The dastardly scheme appears to have originated in Detroit, Michigan. The facts have been given in detail in The Globe

and the Mail and Empire of Toronto, the Star of Montreal, the Kingston News and other journals, but unfortunately many women had been victimised before the facts were made known. The Women's Council deserve great credit and the support of all right thinking persons for their efforts in this matter and to prevent the sale of pernicious literature, and the display of improper posters. It is a most worthy object thus to protect the homes of the land and to prevent frauds upon women who from want of business knowledge have been induced to part with their money to the promoters of fraudulent schemes. It requires constant watch and care, a perpetual warfare to meet the calculating rascality of these schemers, for no sooner is one form of villainy exposed than another is put forward in its place. The Guardian desires to assist the good work in every possible way.

F. W. Wallace, Secretary of the Maritime Funeral Directors' Association, has sent a circular to the press denying that the undertakers of the Maritime Provinces are contemplating a combine for the purpose of raising prices.
