SUPREME COURT.—The Michaelmas term of the Supreme Court for Queen's County was brought to a conclusion yesterday when the hearing of the argument of counsel in the rule nisi in re Martha Campbell v. Samuel Shore et al was continued and finished before Their Lordships Justice Fitzgerald and Hazard, who reserved their judgment. The Court adjourned sine die.

THE MORWENNA.—At an early hour yesterday morning this steamer, which had arrived on the previous night from Montreal with a large general cargo, left here for St. John's, Newfoundland, via Sydney, C. B., with a considerable quantity of local produce. This comprised 1,500 bags of oats, 1,000 bags of potatoes, 1,800 bags of vegetables, 100 cases of eggs, 200 packages of butter, 200 cases of cheese; also two horses and forty head of cattle. In order to enable her early departure, the work of discharging and loading the steamer was carried on through the night.

APPLE PACKING.—The practical work in horticulture for the Long Course students began in the Agricultural hall at 10.30 a. m. The packing tables were set up and some changes made in them by the students to better accommodate the number present. The rest of the morning was spent in making the boxes and taking the measurements of them. The apple box according to the regulations of the Federal Department of Agriculture would be 10x11, 20 inches inside measurement. Everything was put in readiness to start apple packing at 10.30 Wednesday morning.

RURAL MAIL DELIVERY.—To show the extent to which the rural mail delivery system has been adopted by the people of this province it may be stated that it has been ascertained that between two and three hundred rural boxes have been issued monthly since last Spring. Already there are in operation 109 routes established under this system, and in consequence a large number of post offices have been and are being closed throughout the Island. For instance, of roughly a hundred offices which were reported to have been closed last month throughout the Dominion, principally on account of the introduction of the rural delivery system, twenty were in this Island, showing that this Province is keeping abreast with the other provinces in the extension of this system of mail delivery—in fact, it is understood that Ontario and Prince Edward Island are the two provinces in which the system at present is most extensively in operation. The following new routes have been authorized for establishment in this province and are now awaiting the necessary contract arrangements before they can be put into operation:—Milltown Cross No. 1; Milltown Cross No. 2; Bradabane No. 4; New Wiltshire No. 2; New Wiltshire No. 4; Montague No. 4.

WEDDING BELLS.—The Salvation Army Citadel, on Church Street, Moncton, was the scene of an interesting event on Monday evening, when Ensign William Millar who has been in charge of the Moncton Corps for the past year, was united in marriage to Ensign Florence Ethel Anderson, who has had charge of the Army's Work in St. Stephen, N. B., for some eight months. Ensign Millar and Mrs. Millar are well known in Charlottetown, the Ensign having been in charge of the S. A. work here some time ago. Ensign Anderson is a daughter of the late Captain T. Jones Anderson. The meeting opened with hymn "I've Found a Friend in Jesus," followed by prayers by the Rev. G. A. Lawson. Lieutenant M. Forsyth and Cadet N. Forsyth, of St. Stephen, N. B., then favored the audience with duet after which Staff Captain Coombs, read as the scripture lesson the 23 Psalm. The ceremony which was performed by Major Taylor, of St. John, was a very impressive one. Lt. N. The Brant left Georgetown immediately on the receipt of the intimation of the circumstances, and proceeded to search the sea in the vicinity of Cape Bear for the missing boat but up to last night the result of that search was not known in Charlottetown, and at present particulars of the affair are rather meagre.

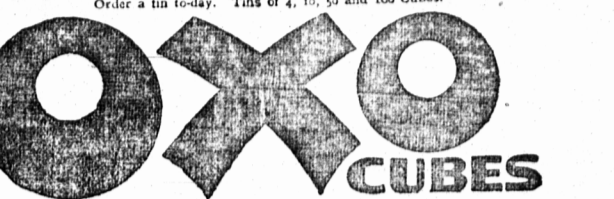
