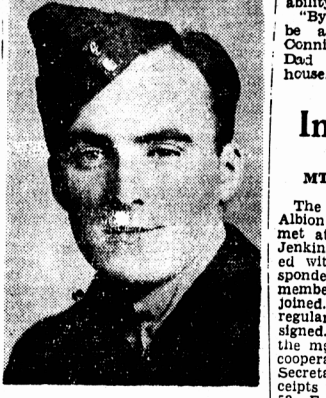

Killed in Action



P. O. JAMES MacDONALD The community of Little Pond was shocked a few days ago when Mr. and Mrs. John F. Macdonald received the sad news that their son, P. O. James I. Macdonald, was killed in action.

James was born in Little Pond on February 4th, 1919. Responding to the call of duty he enlisted in the Air Force in September 1941. The following year he graduated from the Wireless and Gunnery School at Guelph, Ontario, and went overseas in May 1943. He was engaged in many bombing operations over Germany, but on the night of May 24th, while carrying out operations over a target, he and his entire crew failed to return to their base and later it was learned that they were all killed and buried in the cemetery at St. Tropez in Belgium.

Decades was a young man of many sterling qualities, honest, upright and sincere in all his dealings, possessing a brilliant mind, a high moral character, a kind and cheerful disposition and a mind which was never at rest. He was a devoted father, a loving son and brother, and a friend to all who knew him. He was a member of the St. Francis De Sales Church at Little Pond, and the deceased was celebrated. Rev.
