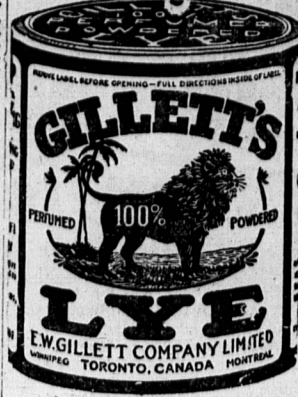
There's Billy Diggs—see him Aunt Enid wonder who gave him the green tie? James whispered to me.

Joanna Southcott's Mysterious Prophecies

Joanna Southcott had her home in Devonshire, in the South of England, and her prophetic utterances have been handed down for a hundred years and more. They have been noteworthy on account of the wonderful manner in which the majority of them have been fulfilled.

Knowing that her death was near she called an English church clergyman named Foley to her bedside and handed him a black box of considerable size and extracted from him a promise that he would be responsible for it and permit it to be opened only at the hour of the nation's greatest peril and direst need.

The stout wooden lid is secured with heavy nails and strong cords and is bound so securely.

What its mysterious secret is nobody knows. For a hundred years now it has lain bound and guarded, since the day that Joanna Southcott closed and sealed it with her own hands, and put it in the safe-keeping of a clergyman as a sacred trust.

Coming from rural farmer stock in the reign of George II, she was a simple country girl, and practically unable to read or write. Then, one day, her quite uneventful life was broken.

On waking one morning, Joanna Southcott found herself gifted with the power of a strange new revelation.

Acquired Prophetic Gifts.

From then onward she was a changed woman. She became fluent of tongue, and gifted with the power of prophecy. Two hundred of those prophecies have already come true.

With uncanny accuracy she foretold the year 1914 as the dawn of the World War, and, further, that Prussia would cause the War, and that the English would come to grips with the German eagle.

Napoleon's reckless venture in Europe was as an open book to Joanna Southcott, and she foretold with certainty that he would fail to invade England, though at the time there seemed every likelihood that he would land an army on British shores.

Joanna Southcott had other things than the foretelling of wars to reveal to the world. But she could not get a hearing with the heads of the Church or State, so she deposited in this black box the greatest of her prophecies and words of wisdom, to be read at some future date after she was dead.

Almost her last act in life was to close the box with iron spikes and strong rope, and give it into the keeping of a clergyman name Foley. She died a few weeks later. On his solemn word of honor, Foley promised that the box should remain closed until four-and-twenty bishops of the English Church should meet together in the hour of England's dire need, and open it in their combined presence.

But at the time people considered all this melodramatic "spook", and from that date the box's whereabouts remained in secret until 1918, when the Great War was nearly over.

England was then at her darkest hour, and the four-and-twenty bishops, impressed with the truth of Joanna's other prophecies, called for her Black Box.

For a short while its fate hung in the balance—would the Black Box be opened at last, and its secret read? But the bishops were not prepared to fulfill all the conditions laid down, namely, to sit in trial for seven days on the revealed contents.

Where is it now? So once more the Black Box passed away, its secret untold, which, according to Joanna Southcott, would spell lasting happiness to the whole world.

Where is it now? Some say the Bishop of London has it in his keeping; certainly it is in the hands of some member of the Church.

But the day will come when the Black Box will be opened. There are many clamoring that now is the time for the twenty-four bishops to meet together and settle once and for all this great mystery.

New Trade Treaty With France Aim Of Fielding's Trip

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—Trade matters in which Canada is interested more than the assembly of the League of Nations are taking on a new trade agreement with France is to be fixed up and this really is the main object of this mission. Although trade conditions with some smaller countries come up in prospect, the situation is not very definite in the later regard and little is being said at the moment.

In respect to the French treaty the facts are that, after the war France decided to abrogate all existing treaties and conditions and start in anew. This was done by an agreement more or less tentative with the understanding that it was to be the subject of further negotiations.

It is to proceed with these negotiations that the finance minister is going abroad. There are several points to be adjusted. The main one is that the United States in its trade arrangement with France has certain advantages which do not apply to Canada. It is safest to secure these.

The Dominion gives a preference to France in her wines and this is a natural factor in securing certain reciprocal concessions in that country.

The operation of provincial prohibition, however, is not conducive to the favourable working of this arrangement in as much as two provinces—Quebec and British Columbia—are in the important business and Quebec alone does most of the wine buying.

Mr. Fielding expects to be away about six weeks.
