### ITALY TO SHARE HER EMPIRE

**Reported Granting Ethiopian Concessions to Reich.**

BERLIN, Oct. 26—(AP)—Italy has promised to give Germany a slice of her Ethiopian melon, a high foreign office source said tonight.

Premier Mussolini will respect Ethiopian concessions granted Germany before the Italian conquest, he said, and Germany also will be granted "an appropriate share" of the economic exploitation of the Ethiopian empire.

All this, the spokesman said, was a direct result of the Berlin visit of Mussolini's Foreign Minister, Count Galeazzo Ciano.

Germany's formal recognition of the Spanish Fascist provisional government awaits only the fall of Madrid, the foreign office said tonight.

Inspired press comments hailed with satisfaction the fact that the world received the German-Italian accord so "calmly."

### ALBERTA SEEKS FINANCIAL AID FROM OTTAWA

**Federal Treasury Said Unable to Help Aberhart Meet Bond Maturities.**

EDMONTON, Oct. 26—(CP)—The Government of Premier Aberhart has appealed to Ottawa for assistance in meeting an Alberta bond issue of \$1,250,000, due Nov. 1. The provincial sinking fund contains only \$366,000 and the balance must be found to escape default.

The appeal to Ottawa was made over the weekend and today Provincial Treasurer Cockroft awaited a reply. He said he asked the Federal Government what assistance it could offer and that no concrete suggestion was outlined.

The Federal Government has not legislative power to loan money to provinces but some arrangement must be made with the Bank of Canada to advance the money.

Alberta faced much the same situation last April and finally defaulted the principal of a \$3,200,000 bond issue. The Federal Government at that time demanded Alberta's approval of a loan council in return for assistance. Alberta turned down the proposition and finally defaulted although the interest on the bonds has been paid since.

**Makes Reply**

OTTAWA, Oct. 26—(CP)—Finance Minister Charles Dunning replied tonight to the request of Premier Aberhart of Alberta for financial assistance, and it was understood the Social Credit leader was advised the Dominion Government had no statutory authority to advance money to the provinces from the Federal Treasury to meet bond maturities.

Mr. Dunning today received a request from Premier Aberhart for assistance in meeting a \$1,250,000 bond maturity due Nov. 1. The provincial treasury, Mr. Aberhart said, has only \$366,000 in the sinking fund to meet this obligation. It was understood the Alberta Premier wanted a loan sufficient to make up the difference.

Under existing legislation the Federal Treasury can loan to provinces only to meet relief expenditures. Governor-General's warrants, used at times to meet unforeseen contingencies, may be exercised only for expenditures urgently needed to meet the public debt of the Dominion.

**Fear Schooner And Crew Lost**

NORTH SYDNEY, N.S., Oct. 26—(CP)—Atlantic storms tonight were feared to have added the names of Captain Thomas Burt of this port, and the three members of the crew of the 39-ton schooner Morrisville to the toll exacted through the years.

The Morrisville sailed from Bonnie Bay, Nfld. for North Sydney 16 days ago. She has not been reported since and storms have swept along both the Newfoundland and Cape Breton coasts in that time.

The captain's son, Bertram Burt and Matthew Richards North Sydney, and Morgan Anderson, Nfld., comprise the crew.

### Will Hear Simpson Divorce Suit Today

IPSWICH, Suffolk, Oct. 26—(AP)—Mrs. Ernest Simpson tonight could look forward to a possible three-minute divorce hearing tomorrow afternoon.

That is the customary speed of the judge who will hear her case. Mr. Justice Hawke tonight set 2:15 p.m. (10:15 a.m. AST) as the time for hearing of the Ipswich assizes divorce suits which include the undefended petition of Mrs. Simpson against her husband, a former officer of the Coldstream Guards.

Mr. Justice Hawke quickly disposed of a short docket of civil and criminal cases today. He indicated that the seven undefended divorce petitions, only cases remaining on the docket, could not be disposed of before Tuesday afternoon.

Court attaches said tonight they did not anticipate a lengthy session on Mrs. Simpson's petition.

tackers should gain the city's gates. A communique issued by the Fascist provisional government at Burgos exultantly declared that rail communication from Madrid was severed at El Escorial, northwest of the capital, and at Aranjuez to the southwest.

(Aranjuez gives the capital vital access to Eastern coastal cities such as Barcelona and Valencia.)

The Insurgents said they held an important bridge over which Fascists troops must cross if they are to attack Madrid from the south.

Against this shifting spearhead of the Insurgent attack, the defenders of Madrid threw a strong line of militia, from Valdeorono, (17 miles south of Madrid), about two miles south and east.

The Government lines appeared to have held fairly firm throughout the day of sporadic Fascist attacks, with a stubborn Government counter-attack reported successful in the El Escorial sector northeast of Madrid.

**FOREIGNERS RELEASED**

Three newspapermen, a Canadian, an American and an Englishman, arrested by Fascists after being abandoned by the Government escorts, were released today and reported sent to Salamanca.

They were Henry T. Gorrell, of Washington, D. C., a correspondent of the United Press in Madrid; James Minifie, formerly of Vanguard, Sask., special correspondent for the New York Herald Tribune and Denis Weaver of the London News Chronicle.

Two other Englishmen, also reported captured by the Fascists, were said to have been released and sent to Salamanca. They were reported as a military attaché to the British Embassy in Madrid, and a director of the Anglo-South American bank.

The Government reported 600 of the enemy had been killed in week-end fighting at Oviedo.

### DISCUSSES DEFENCE TASK

**Hon. Ian MacKenzie Stresses Importance Of Problem.**

LINDSAY, Ont., Oct. 26—(CP)—In an address to a gathering of Lindsay business men and citizens, Hon. Ian MacKenzie, Minister of National Defence, today stressed the "tremendous task afforded by the problem of defence."

"I have been working night and day on a serious problem that is facing Canada at the present time," he said at a civic reception before inspecting the Federal arsenal here. "When we observe the happenings in other nations, where there is an ugly vocabulary of war, we realize that we must stand united, regardless of creed, religious or political, to maintain our religious and civil freedom," he said.

Subsequent to welcoming the Defence Minister, Mayor C. C. Frost recommended that since Lindsay was not susceptible to attack from sea or air, either from Europe or the East, it should be considered as a possible base for manufacture of munitions in event of an extensive Federal defence program.

While stating that he would carefully consider the Mayor's suggestions, the Minister added: "I can make no definite statement of policy at the moment, except to say that we in Canada have something worth protecting if ever a country had, and that we must have a truly modern corps here of which Canada will be proud."

"No country is more deserving of being taken care of than Canada, and I shall do the utmost in my power during the next year to see that all possible is done for Canada in my department," he added.

**Is Remanded For Further Hearing**

MINTO, N. B., Oct. 26—(CP)—Nehemiah Hudlin, 56, mulatto charged with obstructing a police officer and later shooting at two officers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, was remanded to court until next Monday afternoon. He will obtain counsel in the meantime and then appear for preliminary hearing.

After holding police at bay and then eluding them for two days Hudlin was arrested quietly last night in woods near his home at Ripples. He had defied a provincial constable when the latter attempted to serve an execution for a county tax bill for \$3.70. R. C. M. P. men then took a hand, and in an exchange of shots a corporal was slightly wounded.

**Georgetown Dock Workers Strike**

(CP. By Guardian's Special Wire)

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, Oct. 26—(CP-Cable)—Georgetown dock workers went on strike today in protest against shipping companies' refusal to increase wages and the number of men on their payrolls.

The strike was called after a deputation from the Dock Workers' Union met representatives of the shipping firms and asked for a wage increase. The company representatives said they were forced to decline the request because of business conditions.

There was no violence but police were standing by.

### Farm Employment Scheme Discussed

HALIFAX, Oct. 26—(CP)—Plans for placing unemployed youths on Nova Scotia farms as "apprentice farmers" were discussed today at a meeting between Federal Department of Labor and provincial government officials.

Humphrey Mitchell, director of labor transference, and Assistant Director C. W. E. Meath represented the Federal Department, and Premier A. L. Macdonald, Labor Minister Michael Dwyer, Deputy Minister E. B. Paul, and R. H. MacKay the provincial government.

The youths would be placed on farms for six months or a year, a statement issued after the meeting said, to learn agriculture. After this period arrangements would be made to provide the men with their own farms, possibly with government assistance, it said.

**Queen Mary Battered By Terrific Storm**

LONDON, Oct. 26—(AP)—Eight passengers and four sailors aboard R.M.S. Queen Mary were slightly injured as the giant ship was buffeted in a terrific storm, it was disclosed when the vessel arrived at Southampton today, 3 1/2 hours late.

Former Queen Victoria of Spain, who has been in the United States where her son, the Count of Covadonga, was ill, announced on reaching Southampton she would make her home permanently in England. She is estranged from former King Alfonso, who recently has been living in Central Europe.

**Urge Prison Farms For New Brunswick**

(CP. By Guardian's Special Wire)

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Oct. 26—(CP)—After hearing a recommendation for creation of one or more prison farms in New Brunswick, the Royal Commission investigating Canada's penal system left for Fredericton late this afternoon.

At the provincial capital tomorrow the chairman, Mr. Justice Archambault, Montreal, and his colleague, R. W. Craig, K.C., Winnipeg, will confer with Attorney-General McNeil and other Government officials. The Commission will then leave for Montreal. Sitings also have been held at Dorchester, Charlottetown and Halifax.

### Mother Superior Observes 60th Anniversary

ANTIGONISH, N.S., Oct. 26—(CP)—Rev. Mother St. Lucine today celebrated the 60th anniversary of her entry into the order of the Congregation of Notre Dame. The anniversary was marked in Mount St. Bernard Convent where she has been Superior since 1930.

Mother St. Lucine was born Georgina St. Laurent at Rimouski, Que., in 1859, entering the novitiate of the order in 1874 and making her profession in 1876. Then she spent 12 years teaching music in Montreal, 10 years in the Magdalen Islands, and the rest of her life in the Maritime Provinces. She was superior at various houses in the order in Prince Edward Island for 25 years before going to Mount St. Bernard.

**SEEK COMPROMISE**

BERLIN, Oct. 26—(CP-Havas)—The way has been cleared for a Franco-German compromise by the new German-Italian understanding and the Belgian declaration of neutrality, the Government-regulated press said tonight.

Two newspapers, the Montag and the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, declared the time has now arrived for negotiations between Germany and France.

"The security of Western Europe has always been a Franco-German question," the Allgemeine Zeitung said. "The problem of a Western pact has been simplified by the Belgian neutrality declaration."

"The frontier to be taken into account has now been shortened. Franco-German understanding is therefore more important than heretofore."

"Like Italy we are of the opinion that the best means of arriving at this goal will be to sign an unreserved Franco-German repudiation of war with Britain as the guarantor."

Montag's diplomatic correspondent said Germany and Italy both believed "the peace of Western Europe can best be guaranteed by a pact concluded directly between France and Germany."
