OPENING OF THE LOBSTER SEASON

The lobster season opened Monday. Georgetown reports that almost all the lines have been run, but that few traps have yet been set. A good deal of ice still hangs around the shores, threatening loss of gear. Some herring have been taken, for bait, but they are of smaller size than usual—too small for the nets in general use. Fishermen are anticipating good catches later, when the ice moves away. Malpeque reports that no lobsters have yet been taken. In fact, owing to the ice along the north side, few lines have been run except in the bay. At the Murray Harbor fleet of fishing craft left Monday morning to run their lines for the lobster fishing. They report no ice to be seen.

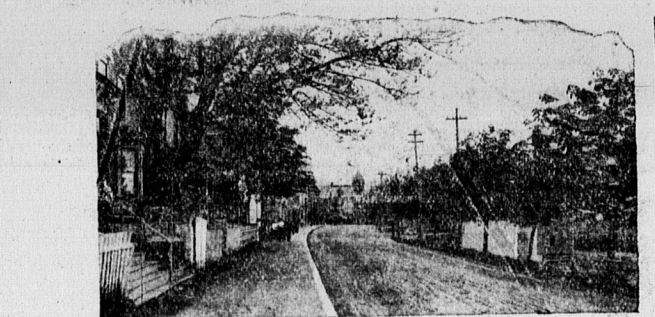

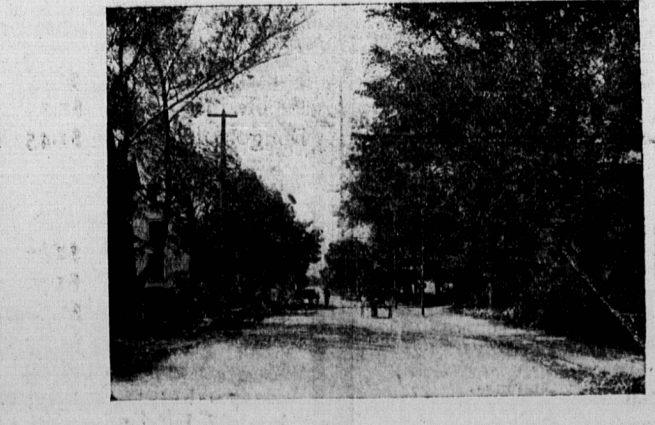

MAIL BAGS STOLEN.
DALHOUSIE, N. B., April 28.—A bold robbery took place here last night. The mail bags which were removed from the Post Office at 11 o'clock and placed in a baggage car of the Dalhousie branch train were stolen from the car.
The disappearance of the bags was not noticed till the train reached the Junction to connect with the Maritime from Halifax. When the employees of the Dalhousie train returned to town they discovered in an old shed near the station, all the bags cut open and their contents of registered letters removed. This included a package containing \$2,000 mailed by the Royal Bank here to the Royal Bank in St. John. There is great excitement over the affair.
