AN ISLAND TEACHER.—The Canadian Corner says—Dr. J. M. Harper, of Quebec, has long been known as a prominent educationalist and historical writer. His latest volume, entitled, "Annals of the War," is intended to commemorate the hundred years of peace, it describes the leading events in the war of 1812, but it is not slavishly chronological, he divides his history of the war into three main campaigns, western, central and eastern, and deals with each separately. Another departure from the stereotyped form of history-telling is his liberal use of the metrical ballad. It is thus a story told in verse and prose. The book proper closes with a scholarly review of what peace has meant to both nations and its value if maintained for the future. There are maps, illustrations, and a collection of biographical notes. Dr. Harper graduated from Queen's University, Kingston, in 1882, and received his Ph.D. from Illinois University a year earlier. He taught school in Truro, N. S., St. John, N. B., and Charlottetown, P. E. I. From 1886 to 1903 he was inspector of Superior Schools in the Province of Quebec. During this time he wrote many educational works, translations and poems. "Chaplain, a Drama," is one of his most recent works. He is still a resident of the city of Quebec.

B., this month, since there is a probability that its scope may extend to this Island. The school will last for five weeks. Of course the announcement has been received.

with pleasure by all cavalymen throughout the neighbouring province, as it has been previously necessary for them to go to St. John's P. E. I., to qualify. A feature of this new course will be that provision is to be made for riding instructions, and the old drill shed is to be converted into a riding school, where twelve horses will be used in the training. A desire which had long been fostered by cavalymen in New Brunswick, was the establishment of a school at which they could qualify for rank without having to leave their occupations and places of business for five or six weeks to go to Quebec. But while the hope is in a measure to be gratified, by the maintenance of such an establishment it has been a further desire that such a scheme should extend to the whole Maritime Provinces, for at present it is necessary that the members of the squadron of Light Horse on P. E. Island and the members of the mounted regiments in Nova Scotia go to Upper Canada to qualify.
