ABOUT THE HOLLAND JAMBOREE  
Prince Edward is to be represented at the Holland Boy Scout Jamboree. Unfortunately the Provincial Council will be unable to finance the trip for the boys, so all those wishing to attend must pay their own way, but first they must be accepted. This means the boys must have passed certain tests and must be approved by the Provincial Council.

Some of the tests they must pass are as follows: Two years continuous service as a Scout previous to Jan. 1937; satisfactory recommendation from school authorities; good record of diligence and efficiency; must carry Dominion registration cards. The boys also must have their Camp Cook's Badge and be a First Class Scout. One can see from looking over these requirements that the boys attending the Jamboree must be fit and ready. The Provincial Council must take boys whose parents can afford to send them and who at the same time are good Scouts and have passed the required tests to the satisfaction of the Council. No boy may attend the Jamboree unless he has passed the required tests. The Council wants boys of whom Prince Edward Island can be proud.
