Capt. J. C. McMillan Honored

Captain Cyrus J. McMillan, (native of Charlottetown.) went overseas as second in command of the McGill Siege Battery, now the 7th Canadian Siege Battery. Previous to enlisting, Captain McMillan was assistant professor of English at McGill. Recently he has published a work entitled "Canadian Wonder Tales."
The following high tribute has been paid to Capt. C. J. McMillan by the officer commanding his division.

I wish to call your attention to the excellent work done by Capt. C. J. McMillan, who was attached to this Brigade as Liaison Officer during the operations against Hill 70.
Capt. McMillan was attached to the Brigade one week previous to the assault. His work during this period was of very great assistance both in the destruction of the trenches, and the harassing of the enemy.
During the actual operations, Capt. McMillan was untiring in his efforts to maintain liaison with the infantry. His advice regarding barages that had to be worked out for the operations undertaken on the afternoon of the 16th, was of very great assistance and I cannot speak too highly of this officer's work throughout the whole of the operations.

CANADA'S NEW FLAG.

Ever since the war began there has been a desire on the part of relatives and friends of our boys, fighting on foreign fields to protect their Canadian homes, to show some outward evidence that they remember and honor those who are absent.
To meet this desire there has been designed a new Canadian Service Flag for use in both home and public place. This flag has a wide red border with a white panel upon which is placed a sufficient number of maple leaves to denote the number of persons on service for the Empire from that particular home or institution. A blue leaf is used to represent each one who is serving, and a red leaf each who has made the supreme sacrifice.

Many churches, schools, lodges, factories, offices, clubs, and public institutions are using the new Service Flag to let the public know the number of men who are wearing the British Khaki gone from their places.
Some of the flags for large places of business, churches and lodges contain many hundred of maple leaves and loyal Canadians point to these flags with a reverence which is almost a worship.
There is not a soldier or nurse who has gone to serve his country who should not be honored and remembered by those who are left at home, and it will not be long before homes and other places in all Canada will be hanging out the new Canadian Service Flag.

Not only are flags being displayed but small Service Flag Pins are being worn by all members of the family to show that one (or more) of their own is serving his Country. There is a bond of sympathy between those having relatives at the front stronger than any kinship, society or religion. It is born of sacrifices made in the name of freedom and liberty, for home and country.
Let us heartily welcome the Service Flag idea and demonstrate in a practical manner that we are proud of
