Returns From Visitation To War Graves

Miss Kathleen Jeffery, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Jeffrey of Linkletter Road, has just returned to Boston, Mass., from attending the International Council of Nurses in Paris and Brussels.

In a letter to her parents, Miss Jeffrey gives a detailed description of the Regina Trench Cemetery at Courcellette, near Albert. Miss Jeffrey was struck with the beauty of the place; the graves are very well kept and are covered with lovely flowers. The drive out from Albert was very pretty and along the road on each side are cemeteries of American, British and Canadian.

In the distance is the War Memorial to 75,000 British Missing soldiers, a beautiful memorial. Near at hand was Canada's Memorial to France, a beautiful memorial with a large flower garden beautifully kept.

Regina Cemetery has a brown stone wall all round it and a black iron gate with cement pillars. On the left hand side set in the massive pillar is a box like compartment with a bronze dome, with a light bronze cross on it. Inside is a book with the names of the soldiers and their regimental number and number of their grave. There is also a book for visitors to record their names. A stone seal is on each side of the entrance walk.

There are walks laid out through the cemetery with archway of stone with seats and inscriptions marked on the stone. A little farther on in the cemetery is a large cross of granite with steps all round; wreaths are laid on this by visitors for the unknown soldiers. There are 1,750 unknown graves in this cemetery. Miss Jeffrey visited her brother's Reginald's grave which is in this cemetery. It has a nice white stone with a Maple Leaf and the name of regiment and date of casualty inscribed on it. Behind the grave is a beautiful rose tree and in front a small white rose, dark roses pinks and poppies. The other graves are very similar with beautiful rose bushes, flowers and well kept grass. An Englishman has charge of the cemetery and took much pleasure in showing Miss Jeffrey round. Trees are planted round the cemetery wall and outside fields of wheat and oats. Miss Jeffrey was so delighted with the way that the cemeteries are kept, just like lovely gardens that she wishes to tell those at home who had dear ones lying there that they have a very beautiful resting place.

Memorable Celebration At Rustico

On Sunday August 20, an event of especial note took place at Rustico when the parishioners of that parish and Hope River together with a large number of relatives and friends from Charlottetown assisted at a Solemn High Mass celebrated by Rev. Cornelius Pineau, S. J., of Rustico, the first French Jesuit of the Island recently ordained at Montreal.

He was assisted by his uncle, Rev. Pierre Pineau as deacon, Rev. Clarence Pihre as sub-deacon, while Rev. J. N. Poirier officiated as master of ceremonies. Rodolph Martin was cantor bearer and Lawrence Gallant was thurifer, the mass being served by two nephews, Alyre and Arthur LeClair. Present in the sanctuary were R. Rev. Monsignor Chaisson, parish priest of Rustico, Revs. F. X. Gallant and W. V. McDonald and C. R. O'Hara, C. S. S. R.

A beautiful and touching sermon was preached by Rev. F. X. Gallant who chose as his subject "The Catholic Priesthood." The music of the mass was beautifully rendered by the choir under the capable direction of Mr. Theophile Blanchard, assisted by Miss Amelia Gallant at the organ. The young priest's entire family present for the occasion, assisted at the mass and received from the hands of their newly ordained brother the Holy Eucharist.

After the ceremony Father Pineau was tendered an address and presented with a well filled purse by the people of the parish and by the former confreres of the young priest in the teaching profession, as a token of esteem and affection for one of their number who had attained such success. The address was read by Mr. Isidore Gallant and the purse presented by Bernard Blaquiere, both members of the teaching profession.

In responding to this token of affection Father Pineau first thanked graciously his friends and relatives for their munificence, then paid the highest tribute to his parents, to those devoted and untiring care coupled with their exemplary lives he owed in great measure his vocation to the holy priesthood. He also took the occasion to remind his hearers of the necessity and importance of a true and edifying family life.

In the evening the whole family were reunited again under the paternal roof, at a banquet where another address was read by Father Pineau's youngest brother, Clarence, who presented him in the name of the family with a spiritual bouquet, to which he briefly replied.

The preceding day at Charlottetown Father Pineau was the recipient of another address and presentation by friends and relatives at the home of his aunt, Mrs. Isaac Doucette, read by his cousin, Alfred Doucette.

New Abattoir For Summerside

The new abattoir built by Messrs Benjamin Schurman and Heath Warren, (contractors), according to instructions from the Town Council of Summerside is now completed and is a credit to the Town, and the builders.

A properly equipped abattoir has long been needed and the Mayor and Councilors are to be congratulated on their initiative in making an effort to provide this necessity. The building is on the land recently purchased by the Town for the purpose, situated a little east of East Street and adjacent to the railway. The building is thoroughly up-to-date, built along the lines of the abattoirs in the large cities.

The floor is of concrete and the walls are concrete half way up. It has running water and is connected to the Town sewerage. There are three large compartments, the killing room, 20 by 20 feet, fitted with tracks which run the carcasses in to the cooling room, where they remain until properly hung. The room is properly insulated so that the room is kept at the right temperature. This compartment is about 25 by 20.

There is a large compartment for the cattle, with a concrete stand, large windows and drainage. Two smaller compartments, one for the boiler, to provide hot water and the other to take care of the offal, completes the building. All the rooms are well lighted and ventilated.

A competent butcher will be in charge and all meat will be inspected before it leave the building. Everything has been done to ensure the citizens of the Town, meat properly killed and delivered to the butchers in the most perfect condition. The contract price for the building was \$1474-6
