

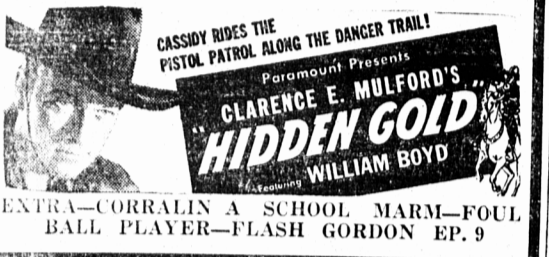

MEN CALLED 'LUCKY GUYS'

(By Ken Clark, Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, Sept. 3 (CP)—Thirty thousand single men, 21 years old, will soon receive registered letters calling them for compulsory training in the Defence Department which will school the men for 30 days refused to admit that this sounds ominous.

As a matter of fact, the Department will be pleased with progress in establishing 30 permanent training camps throughout the nation now engaged in carefully training permanent personnel, considering the men who get the letters to be more fortunate than those who don't.

What it amounts to, the spokesman said, is that those called to start training about Oct. 9 will have a 30-day period in a comfortable camp with the best of food, with sports, with music and the business of learning how to be a soldier.

The department has a list summarizing a training period like that, physical training, sports, drill, lectures, arms drill, shooting and sports, football, skating, swimming, baseball—bring your own skates if you have them—also singing, recreation rooms during your leisure with organ or violin alone. Lights out with warm blankets. Heat. Should Avoid Acquaintance Be Forgotten.

One important point stressed by the department is that attendance at camp will not adversely affect applications for enlistment in the navy, the Canadian Air Force or the Royal Canadian Air Force. Men who have volunteered for these services will either not be called or, if they have been called, they will be pulled out when their numbers come up for the services.

Bearing in mind the importance of personnel the department has senior and junior officers and non-commissioned officers for 119 training platoons in training their men as a subaltern, sergeant, corporal, lance corporal and additionally each camp one subaltern and one sergeant for weapon training.

A man gets his letter and within three days he takes a medical examination from his own doctor. The doctor gets a dollar for the examination. If the doctor declares him fit, he appears before a medical board of three whose decision is final.

If he is fit and so reported he receives another letter instructing him to report at a certain station to board a certain train. There he receives his transportation and goes to camp. Arrived at camp he gets his kit issued and is assigned to a comfortable hut. The sergeant then explains all.

CONSIDER FINANCING GROWERS

OTTAWA, Sept. 5 (CP)—Possible methods of financing western Canada growers until they can deliver their fall harvest to the elevators were canvassed at a meeting today between high officers of the Canadian chartered banks, elevators and representatives of the committee.

Hon. J. A. MacKinnon, Minister of Trade and Commerce and chairman of the wheat committee, said he was not ready to announce results of the conference and that it was possible there would be another meeting.

Representatives of the banks met with the Government committee in Finance Minister Isley's office. Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture was present as a member of the wheat committee.
