POINT POLITICAL MEETING IN THE EAST.

Pursuant to notice large meetings of the interested electors of Annandale, Bay Fortune, Boughton Island and Launching and St. Georges were held in the Red House hall on the 18th and in Launching and St. Georges School houses on the 20th. The Red House Meeting was called to order by appointing J. C. Underhay, Esq., to the chair. In taking the chair Mr. Underhay made a short speech on the current political questions and indorsed the ideas laid down in the notice of meeting. Geo. E. Saville was then called upon to address the meeting, and he gave a statement showing facts and figures in connection with proposed public works mentioned in notice of meeting and moved the following resolution asking for same: We the electors of Bay Fortune, Little River, Little Pond and Annandale assembled together in public meeting on this 18th day of July 1903. Resolved that we desire that the P. E. Island Government shall at once proceed to equip or build the following public works, and trading facilities viz:

- 1st, A bridge on the Grand River at Poplar Point.
- 2nd, A Steam Ferry Boat on the Cardigan River between Newport and Georgetown.
- 3rd, B Steam Packet Service between Charlottetown, Souris, Picton, Georgetown, Annandale and Dundas suitable to our required wants and subsidized by the said P. E. Island Government.
- 4th, The placing of a Gasolene Launch on the Annandale Ferry suitable to carry freight and passengers and to tow a scow for carrying horses.

And as we believe that the future development of this section of country depends on the procuring of these improvements at once. Therefore resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to our representatives at once with the request that they take immediate steps towards getting us these much needed public works and trading facilities. This resolution was seconded by John Howlett Esq. and carried unanimously. Dr. D. E. Morris then addressed the meeting and gave a detailed statement of his position in the matter and read a report of Government Engineer McMillan on survey of proposed bridge at Poplar Point. He was followed by John Howlett Esq. who pointed out the great benefit the country east of Georgetown would receive from these public works especially the stimulus the fresh fish industry would receive by placing Annandale in closer connection with the railroad. He moved the following resolution:—

Whereas, the requirements of the country are in many respects vastly different from those of the shire town, and whereas, those requirements by reason of this ever changing nature require closer attention on the part of the representative to ensure the proper maintenance of public works whenever and wherever necessary to enable the district to compete with the other parts of the province in commercial and industrial pursuits. Therefore resolved that this meeting demands the recognition by both political parties of the principal that in the representation of the district at least, one of the candidates of each party shall be a resident of the country. This resolution was seconded by Dr. Morris and carried unanimously.

Geo. E. Saville then moved a vote of thanks to the chairman which was carried.

A meeting of the Liberal Conservative electors was then held and in view of the resolutions passed at the previous meeting a unanimous standing vote was taken instructing the delegates to nominate and support either J. A. Underhay Esq. or Dr. D. E. Morris as the country candidate at the convention to be held in Georgetown on the 22nd. Geo. E. Saville was also unanimously chosen to give a report of the meeting at the same convention.

At the Launching meeting Innocent Campbell acted as chairman and the same resolutions were unanimously adopted and a wharf at Boughton Island were also asked for. The speakers were Michael D. McCormack, Joseph McPherson, Angus P. Walker, G. E. Saville and D. E. Morris.

At the St. George's meeting John McLennan acted as chairman and the same resolutions adopted at the Launching and Red House meetings were unanimously carried. The speakers being R. J. McLellan, G. E. Saville, D. E. Morris, Edwin Clay, Angus McLellan, and Andrew Mooney. All three meetings were well attended showing that the people felt like asking for their rights and in demanding a country representative to look out for their interests instead of having two members from Georgetown as at present.
