THE ice on the Montague River is reported in a very poor condition. Two horses broke through on Saturday between the Montague Ferry and Georgetown.

THE half and one mile race between Gaudet and Stewart will be called on Monday night; the half mile at 8 o'clock, before the band, and the one mile at 9 o'clock.

A CORRESPONDENT in writing from Montague states that the freshest of Friday night was very heavy. The heavy ice coming down the Montague River broke one of the piles in the Bridge.

A WASHOUT on the P. E. I. Railway near Pisquid on Friday delayed the trains on Saturday. The regular train which should have reached the city in the morning did not get to the city until nearly 7 o'clock in the evening. The mail express was also delayed. The break is 25x35 feet. A temporary repair has been made and trains will run as usual.

Considerable interest was taken in the province of Prince Edward Island in the Scott Act case, brought by the inspector at Saekville, N. B., against the agent of the Dominion Express Co., resulting in a conviction. He was fined \$50 and costs. The liquor was proven to have been sent by express C. O. D., from the Amherst express agent, to agent in Port Elgin to deliver at Port Elgin and collect the price, \$10. The way bill was stamped whiskey, and this was known to the agent at the time of delivery of the goods. Squire Cahill found that the sale was not complete until delivery was made at Port Elgin, but as the act forbids directly or indirectly any sale within the limits of the country of intoxicating liquors the agent was liable in completing the sale. The usual fine was entered up against the company. The case has been appealed to the Supreme Court.

A LARGE and interested audience was again the record of the meeting of the Canadian Temperance League in Massey Hall held a few evenings ago. The chair was occupied by James Massey, ex-Warden of the Central Prison. The president of the league, Mr. J. S. Robertson announced that next Sunday Messrs. Crossley and Hunter, the well-known evangelists, would be the speakers and singers of the meeting. Rev. J. W. Pedley, pastor of Spadina-avenue Congregational Church, delivered a bright and vigorous address, emphasizing the need of keeping up the fight against the saloon. Rev. A. L. Geggie, pastor of Dunn-avenue Presbyterian Church, was the next speaker, and quickly secured the interest and sympathy of his audience by an apt Scotch story, told with that characteristic Scotch forcefulness that is making Mr. Geggie one of our favorite platform speakers. His address was an appeal to the saloonkeeper to get out of the business, and an appeal to the church-going citizens to set their faces determinedly against this evil. He asked that there might be with the temperance people less of resolutions on paper and more of doing—a clean Christian civic conscience. These things were to be accomplished only by a vigorous, plain-spoken educational policy and by persistent aggressiveness. These elements had brought success in other reforms, and would bring success in the temperance reform.—Toronto World.

THE export of the Department of Trade and Commerce of Canada shows that this country sent to Great Britain during the six months, ending December 31, 1899, no less than 25,191,760 pounds of butter, valued at \$4,947,438. For the same period in 1898 the return show 15,739,833, and in 1897, 11,526,592 pounds, valued at \$2,039,197.

IN referring to P. E. Island produce on the Halifax Market the Maritime Merchant says: "There is nothing to add to our last report except that a little more retailing is doing in potatoes. Business in oats is really nominal. The vessels wintering here have not opened yet for spring trade. Oats are 37 to 38c. for large and 39 to 40c. for small quantities. Potatoes remain at 30c. and turnips at 30 to 45c. per bushel."

THERE does not appear to be very much in the rumor that H. M. S. Crescent which visited Charlottetown last summer will be relieved on this station by the battleship Albion, which appears in the latest Navy List as just being launched at Blackwell—not yet commissioned; she is 12,450 tons, carrying 16 guns, and has 19,700 h. p. The people of the North American station prefer a large and modern battleship to a cruiser; although it was found difficult to manipulate Renown in the waters of portions of the North American command. The new proposed battleship is much larger than the Renown.

THE Relief of Ladysmith and How it was Celebrated in Charlottetown is the title of an illustrated pamphlet of over 50 pages that has just been issued. The illustrations supply portraits of the Queen, Premier Farquharson, Mayor Warburton, Col. Moore, and of the late Roland D. Taylor and Alfred Riggs, together with Lord Roberts, Lord Kitchener, Lord Dundonald, Generals Buller, White, French and Warren. There are also cuts of the Colleges, School Buildings and City Hall. The descriptive matter is well written by Philo, and gives a connected story suitable for preservation in permanent form of this notable celebration of an historic event. The names of the militia Officers and men, Officers and members of the militia forces, teacher and pupils of schools and Kindergarten college students, fraternal societies.—In fact the names of all the men, boys and girls taking part in the procession, are given together with a list of the persons and firms who illuminated their buildings in the evening. The souvenir is now on sale at the bookstores.
