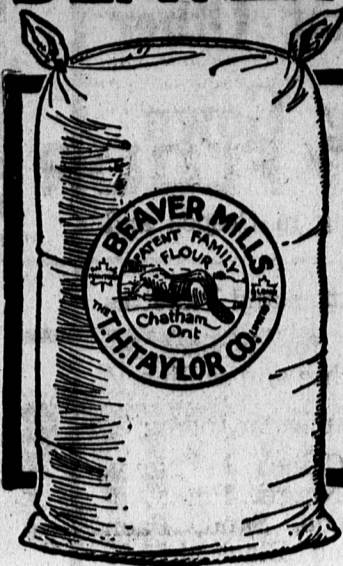

THE LOBSTER SITUATION - The lobster situation this spring is very bad for some packers, and very good for others. As an Eastern correspondent. For those packers who held their fish last spring, and did not sell promptly, the situation is bad indeed, for under the new regulations, these fish for lack of pickle in the cans, turned black and are in such bad conditions that they now cannot be sold and remain a dead issue on the packers' hands, who cannot realize on them and consequently are financially unable to operate this year. The banks, too, that took these fish as security for loans, are stung. But those packers who sold their fish promptly at the end of the season, are in a position to operate on a more advantageous scale than for a year or two. The large amount of last year's pack which cannot be placed on the market, will tend to create a demand by curtailment of supply in Europe, and prices must necessarily be better this season for canned lobsters. The season is opening up unusually early which means an abundant supply of better quality and early fishing. Supplies are 20 per cent less, 30 per cent lower for both fish and cages will also be proportionately lower.
