WORLD SHORTAGE OF MEATS

It is estimated that the world requires fifty billion pounds of meat annually and that while the population increased by 85,000,000 (that is from 510,000,000 to 595,000,000) between the years 1901 to 1914, cattle, sheep and hogs combined, only increased 40,000,000 (that is from 1,065,000,000 to 1,105,000,000). This of course indicates that there is not only a

shortage of meats in the world now, but that as the years go by it must become greater and greater.
