Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any male over
eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter
section of available Dominion land in Manitoba,
Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must ap-
pear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency
or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy
may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency
but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties.—Six months residence upon and cul-
tivation of the land in each of three years.
A homesteader may live within nine miles of his
homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or
certain conditions. A habitable house is re-
quired except where residence is performed in
the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good
standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along
with his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.
Duties.—Six months residence in each of three
years after earning homestead patent; also 5
cres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent is a
obtained as upon as homestead patent, on
certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead
right may take a purchased homestead in cer-
tain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties.
Must reside six months in each of three years
cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction
in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live
stock may be substituted for cultivation under
certain conditions.

CENTRAL FARMERS INSTITUTE MEETING OF EXECUTIVE

A meeting of the Executive of the
Central Farmers Association was held
in Charlottetown on Thursday 27th
inst., at which the following directors
were present: Messrs Charles Arse-
nault, Egmont Bay; J. M. Laird, Kel-
vin; Theo. Ross, North Bedeque; W.
W. Crosby, Cornwall; Edgar Gedd-
ings, Murray Harbor; P. McIsaac,
Souris; John A. Dewar, M.L.A., New
Perth and by special invitation Mr.
A. E. Dewar of the Provincial Board
of Food Control and others.

After a few remarks by the Presid-
ent, the marketing of potatoes receiv-
ed consideration. A resolution had
been forwarded by Onward Institute
of Georgetown, protesting against the
low price being offered for potatoes
and asking the Central Institute to
take steps to keep the farmers in-
formed on the prices being paid in
different parts of the Province and
also in the markets to which our
potatoes are being shipped.

The Secretary pointed out that
there were no funds on hand and that
the Committee appointed to interview
the Commissioner of Agriculture, with
a view to obtaining further financial
assistance, had not yet been able to
fulfill their mission and that very little
could be done in furnishing market
reports.

After a considerable discussion it was
resolved that the farmers of Prince
Edward Island should receive for their
potatoes not less than 60c per bushel
at the loading points to secure a reason-
able return for expenses of produc-
tion. It was suggested that Cold-
Storage Cars be provided on the P. E.
I. Railway to make possible the ship-
ment of potatoes during the winter
months.

It was pointed out that the price of
seed, paris green, bluesone and labor
were so high this year that if farm-
ers had to sell for less than 60c a
bushel, there would be very little
margin of profit and in many cases a
considerable loss, and certainly there
would be no incentive to grow pota-
toes for market in future.

It was further pointed out that the
National Service Commission had
sent me through the country asking
the farmers to increase their produc-
tion of potatoes and suggesting one
dollar per bushel as a price that
would probably be paid. The farmers
responded and by strenuous efforts in-
creased the acreage, bettered the cul-
tivation and now 35c to 40c per bush-
el is being offered which will not
nearly meet the cost of production.

Some remarks made at the opening
of the Exhibition two days previously
were then brought to the attention of
the meeting and the following resolu-
tion was unanimously agreed upon.

RESOLVED that the Directors of
the Central Farmers Institute repre-
senting the organized farmers of
Prince Edward Island, resent the re-
marks made by the President of the
Exhibition Association, regarding the
Contributions made by the farmers to
the various patriotic and relief funds,
also by Sir Louis Davis, Justice of the
Supreme Court of Canada, regarding
the taxes paid by farmers to the Pro-
vincial revenues.

It was noted that the opening of the
Fair at which the production of Prince
Edward Island was exhibited in friend-
ly competition with the products of
the neighboring provinces did not
seem an opportune time to disparage
the moral character of the farmers
and further don't feel disposed to

endure a continuance of such patron-
izing lectures.
Of late it has become popular for
the PROGRESSIVE men to instruct
the farmers of Prince Edward Island
and so we have short and ready meth-
ods of "How to help the boys on the
farm." How the farmers may best fit
the public roads for the joy-riders"
and "how usury and penuriousness in
the parents may become generosity in
the children." The present generation
of farmers of this Province received
their education in generosity and
public giving, when they were acquir-
ing 4c per lb for pork, 5c per lb for
beef, 12c per bush. for potatoes and
22c per bushel for oats, and bending
all their energies to protect the 20 per
cent per annum interest money lenders,
thereby promoting unscrupulous money
lenders. It was also suggested that Sir Louis
Davis be asked to verify or to con-
tradict the statement reported to have
been made by him, that the farmers
had been made by him, that the farmers
in the West and Ontario pay fifteen
times as much taxes as those on the
Island and further Sir Louis be in-
formed that \$40,000 taxes is only a
part of the contributions made by the
farmers to the Provincial revenues.

Other matters were brought up and
ordered to be incorporated in the
President's Annual Address.
It was decided to call the annual
meeting for the middle of January and
the Secretary was instructed to notify
institutes to appoint their delegates
at an early date and make prepara-
tions for the meeting.
The meeting adjourned to the Call
of the Chair.
