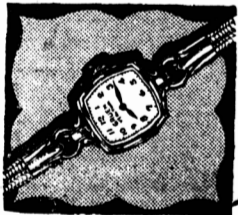

### Appreciative Letters Re I.O.D.E. Gifts

"Diapers were the biggest problem, and in some latencies we had to use old mattress covers which we gave to the mothers to cut up. Once or twice we were able to exchange baby clothes for diapers with one of the other Relief Agencies". From the British Save the Children Fund in Budapest comes this cry for diapers. In the same letter they thank the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire for cases of beautiful baby clothes, boys trousers, socks and warm slippers. "How are you pouncing on the boys' trousers?" Mrs. A. H. Roper, National Executive member of the I. O. D. E. in Prince Edward Island stated that the Order receives letters from individual recipients as well as from those in charge of distribution in Great Britain and many European countries where the I. O. D. E. gifts are being distributed by the British Save the Children Fund and the British Red Cross. She also explained that clothing, bedding, shoes, personal comfort bags and nursery bags are amongst those things which are eagerly received for distribution in Europe. "In addition to contents of 'The Gift' the National Member said: 'The Order has sent tons of Food Parcels through the Commonwealth Gift Centre of the British Food Mission as well as 2,000 individual food parcels per month by parcel post to families whose names were provided by Lady Reading of the Women's Voluntary Services in Great Britain.' "Many of these letters tell of the great distress which was alleviated by the arrival of the I. O. D. E. gifts," Mrs. Roper said, and she quoted the following excerpts from "Thank You" letters received recently by the Order: Devon County Education Committee, Exeter, which Mr. W. E. Phillips is Chief Education Officer, thanks the I. O. D. E. for the large quantities of clothing, bedding and toys; "These gifts are being distributed to children in Remand Homes, Hostels and those

boarded out with foster parents in Devonshire—children from broken homes." The Mayor of the Borough of Kettering, Farnham; the Mayor of Basingstoke; Urban District Council, Hants; St. Just Urban District Council; and Spalding Rural District Council, have all recently acknowledged receiving large bulk shipments of Food Parcels, which they are distributing to the sick, blind and aged. Mrs. Senior eighty-one years of age, who cooks and enjoys a nice meal, writes in appreciation of a monthly food parcel: "It is nice for the older people to be remembered in these difficult days when youth is so much to the fore, and a gift such as yours helps them to know that they still count." Granny Hunter of Knodishall, a remarkable old lady of ninety-five years, was delighted with her shawl, and a boy of sixteen years, who was born healthy and enjoyed school sports until the past few years, had just returned from camp where he had received an I. O. D. E. personal comfort bag and was delighted with the many useful articles contained therein. He had a crippling illness and can't walk and in his interesting letter he said: "You can see what a night I was in. I looked at the water and bathers and washed I could swim. There are many normal pleasures I miss, but I have a Mother. THANK GOD." A girl writes: "I received my nicely coloured personal comfort bag when I was in a Guide Cripples Camp. I am twenty-three years of age and been in the St. Benedict's Hospital quite a few years now and I go to the Girl Guide Camp every year for a holiday." In conclusion Mrs. Roper said, "The members of the I. O. D. E. will continue with this work as long as such assistance is required"

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place where under a hot August sun four years ago the ripe wheat rotted in the fields while Canadian soldiers fought their way inch by inch along the twenty kilometers to their goal and the destruction of the Seventh German Army. At Beny one can look out to the Channel where the choppy waters carried the brave armada which landed at Berneville Courseulles one bright June morning in 1944. At Beny many who came ashore over the Calvaire beaches remain in peace forever more, while further inland still more of their comrades lie at rest by the side of the road running straight from Caen to Falaise near Brettreville-sur-Laise.

#### IN BELGIUM

I was able to spend a brief period at Ypres in Belgium, so well known to many thousands of Canadians during the First World War. The beautiful Menin Gate still stands at the eastern approach to the town, and nightly its high arches echo the shrill notes of the Last Post, played by Belgian veterans in honour of that vast throng of over fifty thousand men of the British Empire who perished in the holocaust that was the Ypres Salient and at the inscription reads, "In memory of those whose names are known and honored burial given to their comrades in death." During the retreat of the allies in 1940 it was necessary to blow up the bridge over the canal which flows on the east side of the Menin Gate and the memorial suffered slightly from this demolition. Bullets from pursuing German aircraft scarred the walls, and the lion which sits atop the monument was also damaged. These ravages are now being repaired and workmen are busy restoring the Gate to its original perfection. A new Cloth Hall has been built on the site of the old one on the market place, although some of the ruins of the old hall have been left in their original position as a constant re-

minder of the tragedy which war once brought to the town.

#### ORRERA'S TRIBUTE

General H. D. G. Orrera, our wartime commander, was a member of the special Canadian Mission which was present at the coronation of Queen Juliana of the Netherlands this past August and, following the ceremonies at the Hague, he made a tour over the battlefields where his Army had fought four years ago. The General was vitally interested in the Canadian cemeteries and made it a point to visit each one of them. On the day I left the Continent I was privileged to be a member of his party when he visited the Canadian Military cemetery at Adagein in Belgium, not far from the Leopold Canal where such bitter fighting took place in the fall of '46. My last sight and memory of those hallowed fields was a warm one, of the former Army commander paying his respects to his comrades-in-arms who had made the supreme sacrifice without which victory could never have been achieved.
