DISTRICT MEETING

Held in Methodist Church At Brackley Point

REV. R. OPIE PRESIDED

Rev. George Steel President Of the Conference De-livers Address.

The Financial Meeting of the Charlottetown District, was held in the Methodist Church at Brackley Point Road, on Thursday, the 22nd, commencing at 9.30. The Rev. R. Opie presided.

All the ministerial members of the District were present, including Revs. G. M. Young, J. W. McConnell, W. B. Thomas, Thomas Hicks, Joseph Parkins, S. H. Rice, A. D. McCully, F. Frizzle, W. W. Wass, H. Pierce. The following laymen were present: Golding Howard, Stas Prowse, A. D. Dollar and Colonel Moore, S. F. Drake and Geo. Rackham.

After the usual devotional exercises the District proceeded to its business. The Chairman on behalf of the District warmly welcomed the ministers, who have entered into the Island work since the close of Conference. In doing so, he referred to the progress that had been made during the past few years in the construction and renovation of churches and parsonages within the limits of the District. On many circuits, including Charlottetown, Cornwall, Little York, Montague, and Pownal, great activity had been displayed by the people in this enterprising work. The brethren might well be congratulated on the beautiful and well equipped sanctuaries throughout this fair portion of the Island in which they were called to minister.

The District then carefully inquired into the receipts and expenditure of the Missions for the current year and as usual recommended them to the favorable consideration of the Central Missionary Board.

TWENTIETH CENTURY EVANGELISTIC MOVEMENT.

The Rev. George Steele, President of the Conference, who is visiting the Districts throughout the Conference, attended the afternoon session, and delivered an impressive and helpful address on the subject of the "Thanksgiving Evangelistic Movement." A long conversation ensued in which all the brethren participated, and a resolution was passed pledging the District to carry out as far as possible the recommendations of the Conference, and which were published in extenso in Saturday's GUARDIAN.

On motion, the President was thanked heartily and unanimously for the timely, helpful, and effective address, delivered during the afternoon session.

A resolution was also passed expressive of the Districts' appreciation of the hospi-

talities of the Brackley Point Road friends during the sessions of to-day, and the pastor, the Rev. T. Hicks, was requested to convey its thanks to them in the usual way.

A most enjoyable service was held in the evening when the President of the Conference preached to a crowded church on Ex. 14-15, "Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward." Mr. Steele who was formerly pastor of the York Circuit, was heard with pleasure and profit by his numerous friends.

Westminster Confession Revision.

The Presbyterian Creed Revision committee that is to meet at Saratoga a week hence was named by the last general assembly's direction, and is supposed to represent all shades of faith in the denomination. It does not meet at this time to begin revision, but probably to frame a letter to be sent to all of the 232 Presbyteries. The agitation of last spring was backed by about forty presbyterians and the committee named thereto. Now the committee will undertake to find out what the other presbyteries think of the matter, whether they want a new creed or the old one revised, and what form they think the changes should take.

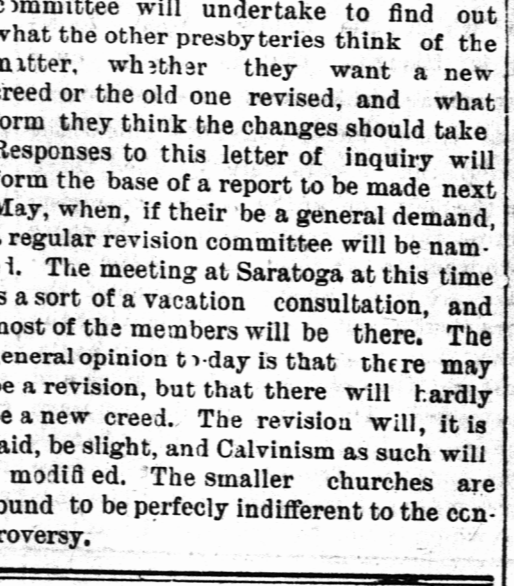
Responses to this letter of inquiry will form the base of a report to be made next May, when, if their be a general demand, a regular revision committee will be named. The meeting at Saratoga at this time is a sort of a vacation consultation, and most of the members will be there. The general opinion to-day is that there may be a revision, but that there will hardly be a new creed. The revision will, it is said, be slight, and Calvinism as such will be modified. The smaller churches are found to be perfectly indifferent to the controversy.
