New Dial Telephone Service Opens At S'side; Interesting Program Held

Some hundreds of Summerside people were apparently sitting by their telephones at ten o'clock last night with fingers on the dials waiting for the magic minute when they could give them the first twirl.

So fast did the calls commence that Mayor Henry Wedge's call to Mr. A. R. Brennan was probably only officially the first call. The connections had been broken by hundreds of toothpicks stuck in the mechanism and when the word came to "cut-over" six employees working as fast as they could pulled them all out and opened the connections to the dial system.

Actually it might have been as late as three minutes after ten when all phones were cut over. Telephone company officials said afterwards that everything went smoothly and without a hitch. One of them said that if one could listen on all the conversations they would be very much alike and the words "it works" in a surprised tone, would be heard many times.

They said that the rush of calls was no greater than in other places where they have put in a dial system. An interesting program had been arranged for the occasion which commenced at 9:15. Mr. D. M. Gass, provincial manager, acted as chairman and congratulated Mayor Wedge on his recent election.

He expressed appreciation for the support and cooperation received by the company from the town officials, Board of Trade and citizens generally. Mr. A. M. MacKay, Halifax, general manager of the company also offered congratulations to Mayor Wedge and said he was happy to be present for this auspicious occasion, which is a great step forward for the Town.

He said his company is proud to supply Summerside with this fine stone and brick building which would not be out of place on the main street of any city. He paid tribute to the staffs under Mr. Leigh Stewart and Miss Clara Mountain who have carried on during difficult times and with over-loaded equipment.

Growth of Service
To give some idea of how the telephone service has grown in Summerside he said that in the ten years from 1929 to 1939 the number of stations in Summerside increased by 116 and in the next ten years the increase jumped to 1070. Mr. MacKay said that the dial equipment and toll board installed are the best in the communication world. He explained that in installing the dial system here the company was not discriminating in favor of Summerside.
