(Continued from page one) In 1919 on account of extra requirements, but not now with a bounding revenue, the surplus this year being \$69,000,000. Although he believed in the total abolition of the sales tax, he asked for discontinuance in a restricted way. The sales tax amounted to \$71,000,000, and a large amount of money was required to retire maturing obligations, but the tax on clothes and boots and shoes only amounted to \$7,000,000, but would relieve the ordinary consumer—the farmer, the fisherman, the miner, the artisan, and the ordinary working man to that extent.

The minister of finance has brought down a rich man's budget" said Mr. McDougall. "It is now my privilege to move a poor man's amendment to a rich man's budget." The Hon. Mr. Robb twisted the Opposition with inconsistency in trying to impose taxation by the indirect method of protection while trying to decrease direct taxation. A considerable element in the House was opposed on the one hand to protection and believed in direct taxation in the form of income tax, that and the sales tax being on all fours. He claimed that the effect of the amendment would be to reject the \$22,000,000 reduction provided in the budget. A vote was taken, the amendment being defeated by 111 to 54, all except the Conservatives voting nay.

Another amendment was moved, as soon as this was disposed of by General McRae condemning in moderate and rather sweeping terms the immigration policy of the government which occupied about two hours. His speech in support was upon the House going into committee on the estimates for colonization and immigration. It was on the whole a constructive as well as a destructive speech, outlining a scheme he had advocated last year. At six o'clock the Hon. Robert Forke was speaking in reply.

Crop reports for Canada issued today has this in regard to the Atlantic provinces, as of date March 31st: "The winter has been mild, much similar to last year, with the result that live stock are in good condition. There is plenty of feed on hand. Potatoes are very plentiful, but, as there is no market for them, farmers have been compelled to feed them to stock. Draft horses, good fresh cows and beef cattle are each in demand, as well as young pigs. In some instances prices have advanced from last year. Prospects are for an early spring.

The Ocean Limited, leaving Halifax yesterday morning, had two express refrigerators car laden with fish, and at Truro the train took on two more which had arrived from Mulgrave, the train being made up in two sections at Truro to accommodate the extra cars. Yesterday morning, on the Halifax and South Western, two express refrigerator cars, laden with fresh fish, one from Lunenburg and the other from Liverpool, were taken to Yarmouth, thence to be shipped by boat to the Boston market.

75TH BIRTHDAY OF NOTED SON OF P. E. ISLAND

Appreciative Sketch of Career of Dr. J. G. Schurman.

The following editorial, from the St. John Telegraph Journal of May 22nd, will be read with interest and appreciation in this Province. Dr. Schurman was born at Freetown, Prince County, and has many relatives living here:

"Jacob Could Schurman, a native of Prince Edward Island, who is United States Ambassador to Germany, and had previously been Ambassador to China, is seventy-five years old today. Few Canadians have pursued a more brilliant scholastic career than Dr. Schurman, who for a long period before he accepted a diplomatic position was President of Cornell University. After attending the Summerside Grammar School and Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown he entered Acadia College in 1873, remaining for a year and a half leading his class in all subjects and winning several money prizes. In 1875 he won the Canadian Gilchrist Scholarship in connection with the University of London, where he graduated later with the University scholarship in philosophy, and was also leader in Greek, English, Logic and Political Economy. The years 1877-78 found him pursuing his studies in Paris and Edinburgh, and he took his doctor's degree in philosophy in the latter year. Also in that year he won the Hibbert Traveling Fellowship in competition with over sixty men from Oxford, Cambridge, Edinburgh, and other British universities. Going to Heidelberg, Berlin, Göttingen and Italy he continued his studies, and later was honored in turn by Columbia, Yale, Williams College, Dartmouth College and Harvard. In the meantime, from 1880 to 1882 he was a professor at Acadia College and from 1882 to 1886 in Dalhousie. Going thence to Cornell University he was called to the Presidency in 1892. In 1895 he was appointed president of the Philippine Commission. In 1905 he was made a trustee to the Carnegie Fund for retired college professors.

"Dr. Schurman was a prolific writer. His Kantian Ethics and the Ethics of Evolution appeared in 1881; Ethical Import of Darwinism, 1888; Belief in God; Its Origin, Nature and Basis, 1890; Agnosticism and Religion, 1896; A Generation of Cornell, 1898. He was joint author of a report of Congress on the Philippines in 1902. His brilliant abilities recommended him for an ambassadorial career in later years, and in that capacity he has added to his laurels.

"Great man though he is, Dr. Schurman was unable to interpret the feelings of his fellow Canadians. Addressing the students of Cornell in 1896 on the Venezuelan question he referred to the future "emancipation of all American Commonwealths by the withdrawal of European powers from this continent," and predicted that in that event, Canada would seek admission to the United States.

"There was another brilliant Islander, the late Frank A. K. Lane, who rose to high rank in public life in the United States, and of him it was said at one time that but for his foreign birth he might have been President of the United States. Dr. Schurman, like Mr. Lane, has shed lustre upon his own country by his brilliant services to the country of his adoption."

"I would draw your attention to the report of the Duncan Commission, section 12, pages 23 to 26, where you will find the most important recommendation regarding transportation, that advocating the extension of the power of adjusting freight rates, to the Board of Railway Commissioners. The Federal Government has not yet seen fit to implement this part of the report. Should it do so, I feel that it would mean the solution of one of the most serious problems affecting "the regulation of trade" between the Maritimes and the other provinces.
