W.M.S. Convention

The Annual W. M. S. Convention of the Summerside District met in the Methodist Church, Tryon, on Wednesday August 25th. The morning session opened at 10.30 with devotional exercises conducted by Rev. Mr. Fitzpatrick. He took for his subject the necessity for prayer in Mission Work, basing his remarks on 1 Timothy 2: 1-8. Mrs. Thomson, District Superintendent then took the chair and the rest of the session was devoted to the hearing of Reports from the Auxiliaries, Circles and Bands.

The Afternoon Session opened at 2.30 with singing and prayer was offered by Mrs. A. T. Wright. Next was the Roll Call of Delegates and the Minutes of the morning session. The hearing of Reports was concluded. Mrs. Barraclough, Circle and Band Secretary, was introduced to the Convention. She gave an interesting address speaking more particularly to Band Leaders. She said the future hope of Missions was in the children trained in the Mission Bands. The Leader must prepare carefully beforehand for the meeting and present the lesson in an interesting way, aided whenever possible by pictures etc. to appeal to the children's interest. A paper, "What this Convention means to me", was read by Miss Alma Inman, one on "Obedience" by Miss Louise Calbeck, and one on "Band Work" by Mrs. John Fitzpatrick. An exercise "Sowing the Seed" was given by the children of Tryon Mission Band. Mrs. Thomson gave a short talk, illustrated by charts, a paper on "Leaflets" by Mrs. Westmoreland was read by Miss Lizzie Leard. Mrs. J. W. Wright then conducted an Auxiliary Conference which was taken part in by the Delegates and proved both interesting and helpful. Mrs. W. A. Thomson was re-elected District Superintendent and Mrs. J. W. Wright Associate Supt. A paper on "Prayer" written by Mrs. Rice was read by Miss Mutart.

The Evening session opened at 8.30 by singing "Onward, Christian Soldiers". The Scripture Lesson from Romans 10, was read by Rev. Geo. Ayers. After a selection by the Choir Mrs. Thomson presented the report of the year's work. She said the year had been strenuous but the giving had been simply marvellous. She found that those societies that started the year with an objective had done the best work. A new Auxiliary had been organized at Desable. An interesting Pageant featuring Britannia and her Colonies was given by the Mission Circle of Tryon.

Mrs. Thomson extended the thanks of the Convention to the people of Tryon for the royal way in which they entertained the Delegates and Visitors, to the choir for their excellent music, and to all who had in any way contributed to the success of the Convention. The National Anthem brought the meeting to a close.
