**REVIEWS MARKET PROSPECTS.**—There is a good demand for turnips and if farmers will store their crop and feed the market gradually the chances are that prices will advance shortly a produce dealer in Charlottetown said yesterday. If large quantities of turnips are crowded on the United States markets the price quite likely will remain low, he said. The potato market, he was afraid, "would be easier until after the frost." At present there are 63 cars on track in Montreal and thirty more cars rolling. "Far too many for this time of year," the dealer said. Once all the potatoes are in winter storage the farmers will probably sit tight and prices will be much better. The Farnorth sailed Monday afternoon for Boston with 35,000 one-bushel bags of turnips.
