HYDRO DEVELOPMENT IS BEING ADVANCED

Progress is being made by Sir Adam Beck in impressing upon the Ontario Government the importance and necessity of new power development. The Cabinet has had the plans and estimates of the Hydro Commission before it for nearly two months past, but the size of the project has made many conferences necessary between the Ministers and the chairman and his engineers. During the past few weeks the Hydro-Electric Commission, by signing on a new large customer, exceeded its available supply of power under the contract with the development company, and found it necessary to secure an extra supply from the company. To meet the constant increase in consumption the commission is now applying to one of the other companies at the Falls, the Canadian Niagara, for an additional 50,000 horse power. This power, it is understood, can be secured at favorable rates under the commission by the development now planned is able to furnish its own power. The new development, which, as Sir Adam Beck announced some time ago, will utilize the overflow of the Welland Canal, will, at the outset, be composed of two units of 50,000 horse power. By the time they are ready the consumption of power by the Hydro System will, it is expected, be sufficient to immediately give business to both units. The plans provide for utilizing the Chippewa Creek and carrying the water by an open canal across country to a point below the Whirlpool.

BELGIUM DIED FOR ALL EUROPE

STANDS ALONE AMONG ALL THE ALLIES IN DEMAND FOR COMPASSION OF THE WORLD.

LONDON, Jan. 5.—"There are countless tender consciences among the bewildering and heartrending by-products of this war," said G.K. Chesterton, recently, "but this is not a case for compassion."

Mr. Chesterton was discussing the plight of Belgium as a result of her heroic stand during the first days of the war. "This is a case," he continued, "for that more working minimum of a sense of honor that makes us repay a poor man who has advanced his last penny to post a letter we have forgotten to stamp. In this respect Belgium and other allies may well stand aside till she is paid to the uttermost farthing."

"There has been self-sacrifice everywhere else but it was the self sacrifice of individuals each of his own country, the individual dying for Serenissima, the Italian for Italy. But the Belgians did not merely die for Belgium. Belgium died for Europe."

"If we even privately utter a murmur, or even privately grudge a penny for binding the wounds of so solitary and exceptional a martyr, we ourselves shall be something almost as solitary and exceptional."

Mr. Chesterton's appeal is couched in mild terms as compared with what is deserved by the widows and orphans of Belgium according to those who have recently returned from the desolate wastes and the ruined cities of the not long ago prosperous little country. One and all they are unimpaired in emphasizing the debt that the British Empire owes Belgium. The scenes these returning people picture are in some instances too terrible to describe even if words could describe them.

The long queues outside the bread depots tell the story. The thin, clad, weeping women endeavoring to be brave through their tears, and the shivering, ill-fed children clinging to their skirts—they tell Belgium's story. And this starvation and destitution is all because Belgium stood with her face to the enemy when that enemy threatened Britain.

This and volumes more is the reason such instant appeal is being made to the Belgian Relief Committee, the great object being the present salvation of starving Belgium. Wheat means both work and bread for these long lines of Belgian woman and children and for \$2.50 one Belgium family can be kept from starvation a month. Belgium is starving and Canada is the only part of the Empire that can spare the wheat she needs. Unless this wheat is sent by Canada as a part of the payment of Britain's debt of honor to Belgium thousands of women and children will die of starvation this winter.

WHAT CANADA PAYS!

SOLDIERS PAY AND ALLOWANCES, CONDITIONS OF ENLISTMENT PROVISION FOR WIVES, MOTHERS AND CHILDREN

Canada is determined that her sons shall be as well paid and their families as well cared for, as a grateful and wealthy country can afford. The scale of pay for Overseas Service, the allowances from the Patriotic Fund, and the Pensions, are on a more liberal basis than those of any other country engaged in the war.

SCALE OF PAY

Table showing Rank, Pay, Field Allowance, and Separation Allowance for various military ranks.

The men are, of course, fed and clothed by the Government. The Separation Allowance is the sum paid by the Government to the wife of each enlisted man, or to the widowed mother if the son is unmarried and is her sole support. This is in addition to part of his pay which is reserved for her.

One-half of a soldier's pay is withheld by the Government and paid to his dependents. This ensures that at least \$35.00 per month is paid by the Government to the wife of each soldier.

THE PATROTIC FUND

The Patriotic Fund has been created to assist those dependents of a soldier who need more help than the Government gives. From this Fund the following sums are paid if the need exists:—

Table showing Wives, Children of widowers, Mothers of unmarried men, and Children of married men according to age and number in family.

Ladies representing the Patriotic Fund pay regular visits to families of men on Overseas Service, and give friendly advice and practical help in case of need. Many employers have pledged themselves to give preference to returned soldiers when engaging men.

PENSIONS

The Canadian scale of pensions range for private soldier, from \$75.00 per year for certain minor injuries to \$264.00 for total disability. In case of death \$22.00 a month is paid to the widow, and \$5.00 a month for each child. A widowed mother whose son was her whole support receives \$22.00 a month.
