ROUSING MEETING AT BRADALBANE

Scores Unable to Gain Admission. Opposition Speakers Driven to the Wall. The Government Arguments were Clinching and Decisive.

Mr. McNevin, the first speaker, thanked the electors for the handsome support given him at the last election, and from the reception he received amongst the people both here and throughout the district he was looking forward to a largely increased support on the 24th for Mr. Kennedy and himself. QUITE TRUE OF THE LIBERALS

G.W.V.A. EXCLUDES ENEMY ALIENS

Refuse to Affiliate with Trades Unions Until Latter Exclude Aliens.

NEW GLASGOW, N.S., July 20.—The Great War Veterans of Nova Scotia will never have any aliens as brother, nor enter into formal relation or co-operation with any organization which includes alien enemies of those of alien enemy extraction in its ranks. That point was made clear here yesterday at the provincial convention which developed marked hostility to affiliation with the Trades and Labor Councils until the latter unions alter their constitutions so as to purge their ranks of all aliens of enemy nationality.

Cedric Arrives With More Troops

British Offices For Asia Minor

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, July 20.—The Inter-Allied Council decided today that General H. H. Haultboy, of the British army, should take entire charge of the occupation of Asia Minor with supervision over British, French and Greek and Italian troops. It was believed this settlement would stabilize conditions in Smyria and other parts of Southern Asia Minor and prevent clashes between Greeks and Italian troops.

Death of Mr. Maurice Blake

In the death of Mr. Maurice Blake, who passed away at his home "Deavourport" Malpeque Road on Sunday, Charlottetown has lost one of its most prominent and highly respected citizens. Mr. Blake had been in failing health for some time and those who knew him best will sincerely mourn his demise. As a citizen he took a keen interest in every movement having for its object the welfare of the city and the Province at large, while as a business man he enjoyed the confidence of his fellow citizens and was largely instrumental in building up the widely known and successful establishment of Blake Brothers. In politics Mr. Blake had always associated himself with the Liberal Conservative party and was a speaker of considerable power. He had a strong grasp on all the leading questions which from time to time engaged the public attention and though on several occasions strongly urged by his friends to offer himself as a candidate for election to the Legislative Assembly, modestly refused, though there is little doubt but that he would have proven successful in winning a seat. He however was for quite a number of years convener of the Liberal Conservative Association for Queen's County and discharged his duties in that capacity with fidelity.

Strike Leaders on Trial in Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, Man., July 21.—Before Magistrate Sir Hugh John Macdonald, the preliminary hearing of the twelve strike leaders arrested during the recent sympathy strike began at noon today. An array of counsel unequalled in many years at court proceedings in Winnipeg was present. Labor had four lawyers present to watch their interests, and Alfred J. Andrew, K.C., was assisted by a half dozen fellow attorneys. Stacks of documents were brought into the court room seized in recent raids on labor temples and in private homes of the leaders.

SPLENDID MEETING AT RUSTICO

Government Candidates Made a Most Favourable Impression.

A splendid meeting was held in Rustico Hall on Friday night, when the Government candidates, Messrs. L. L. Jenkins and Chester McLure, who have been gaining ground on all sides at a remarkable rate, made a forcible impression in striking contrast with the usual Opposition harangue of insincere criticism and wilful misrepresentation. Mr. Joseph Doucette was chairman, the speakers being Premier Arsenault, Messrs. Jenkins and McLure, Conservatives; and Hughes and LePage, Liberals; with Mr. Blanchard supporting their cause. The hall was packed to overflowing, and every inch of available standing room was occupied. The meeting was a decided success from the standpoint of the Government, whose candidates were both received with warm enthusiasm and listened to with the closest attention. While the Premier, rising to speak after midnight, found his hearers, who had begun to show signs of restive intolerance during an exceptionally trying effort of his opponent, Mr. Blanchard, at once sympathetic and interested. The Government's position was placed before the meeting in a manner that could not fail to convince the reasoning electors of Rustico that the administration of public affairs during the past four years had been one of unprecedented success from every point of view, and notwithstanding the desperate efforts of the Liberal candidates, reinforced by a declamatory oration of upwards of an hour on the part of Mr. Blanchard, the judgment of the audience was unequivocally with Mr. Arsenault and his party. Mr. Jenkins is well known as a public speaker, and it was a simple matter for him to dispose of Mr. Hughes, who, as was only natural to expect, repeated misstatements which had been refuted scores of times before and which he had not the sagacity to see were obviously untrue that the mere mention of them was enough to injure his already hopeless cause in the eyes of his intelligent audience. The appearance of Mr. Hughes on a political platform now inevitably suggests the word "asylum," and in due course he turned his attention to statements he was careful of not making. He was careful of not making any reference to his pet subject and he made general charges of extravagance in the management of the Asylum, comparing the cost today with that under the Liberals some years ago. He was asked by a member of the audience whether he paid the same prices for his food and clothing today as he did before the war, and Mr. Hughes thereupon proceeded to take up another subject.

Difference Between Greece and Bulgaria

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, July 21.—Premier Clemenceau has proposed to the Supreme Inter-Allied Council, according to newspaper reports today, that foreign minister Tittoni of Italy be designated to draft a report on the territorial difference between Greece and Bulgaria. One of the chief causes of friction between Greece and Bulgarians has been their rival claims to western Thrace. Greek sources reported some time ago that Bulgarians were seeking to have Greeks in western Thrace make declarations that they were Bulgarians enforcing this plan by withholding food from those who refused to renounce Greek nationality.

French Government Demand Reparations

PARIS, July 21.—The French Government will demand reparation from Germany as a result of the death of a Sergeant Major of the dragons at the hands of persons unknown in Berlin according to La Liberté. The incident occurred at the French embassy where the officer was on guard. A despatch received here from Berlin states that Mr. Haniel Von Haimhausen has called on the Spanish ambassador in charge of French interests in Germany expressing regret for the incident and adding that the person guilty of the French soldier's death will be punished.

Yorkshire Mines Are Flooded

LONDON, July 21.—Three mines in Yorkshire district are flooded, and twelve others are likely to be filled with water in a day or two, Premier Lloyd George announced today in the House of Commons, as a result of the punpmen's strike. Some of the mines, he said, would be ruined. The government is sending men from the fleet in aid in pumping out the mines.

Revictualing of Austria

PARIS, July 21.—The Austrian peace delegation has sent a request to the supreme council of the Allies that the revictualing of Austria which was interrupted on July 7 be resumed and continued throughout August and September.

Saturday being an off-day with the City Liberals, they camped at Belle River and had a regular old-time picnicking at the meeting in the evening. Among the more prominent city Liberals (in addition to a host of lesser lights) were Mr. F. J. Nash, Mr. Reuben Macdonald, Mr. Geo. S. Inman, Dr. Cyrus J. McMillan, Mr. George Gardiner, and Mr. A. B. Warburton. Only one Liberal Belfaster was among the Liberal speakers, all the others being imported for the occasion.
