WHAT the St. John Star says:—Prince Edward Island is cut off from telegraphic communication with the mainland. Such a state of affairs is a shame and disgrace to Canada. The steamer service to the island in winter is most unsatisfactory. It is high time Canadian Government grappled in earnest with the problem of giving that important province better means of communication with the rest of the world.

THE entries for the Maritime Winter Fair assure the fact that there will be a magnificent display of Fat Stock in the Curling Rink Amherst, on the 17th, 18th, and 19th inst. The cattle entries number 87 of which 26 are Pure Bred Shorthorns, the sheep entries aggregate 88, and there will be a good display of swine and dressed poultry. There are thirteen entries in the class for dressed mutton carcasses and over a dozen in bacon carcasses. A new building is being erected to hold the sheep exhibit.

UNEXPECTED.—Departed this life at Peter's Road, Lot 68, November 27th, Isaac A. Bears aged 74 years. The deceased was able to be around as usual until less than three weeks previous to his death. Prostrated by the rupture of a blood vessel of the brain, followed by a stroke of paralysis despite the efforts of the best medical skill, he sank rapidly, until at length he peacefully entered the realms of eternal day to be forever with his God.

The saints of God from death set free,
With joy shall mount on high;
The heavenly host with praises loud
Shall meet them in the sky.

The deceased was born at Cape Canso, N. S. in 1827 and was of Loyalist descent. His mother was a member of the Whitman family, being a near relative of Abraham Lincoln. He came with his wife and one child to this island about 48 years ago, and settled in Murray River. Some time afterwards he removed to Peter's Road. During the greater part of this time, he was engaged in teaching and farming. He was appointed a justice of the peace a number of years ago, and had much to do in that capacity. His judgement in matters of law was generally recognised by his associates to be of a superior character. He was ordained an elder of the Church of Scotland by the late Rev. Donald McDonald, and on his removing to Peter's Road, he identified himself with the Presbyterian Church there in which he was a leading elder. He led an exemplary Christian life, and was always foremost in what was for the general good of the community. His efforts in this respect, the Christian spirit shown by him in his daily life, his forbearance in trying circumstances, lead us to conclude that he dwelt in close communion with God. The funeral services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. D. J. McDonald, who spoke very impressively from James IV 14. The remains accompanied by a large concourse of relatives and friends were interred in the cemetery at Murray Harbor North. He leaves a widow and family of five sons and five daughters, three daughters having died previously. To the widow and family the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended. May they in their bereavement confide in their Heavenly Father, and be consoled with the thought that there shall be a blissful reunion where sorrow and parting shall be no more. The surviving members of the family are J. Harris Bears, of Moncton, N. B. Isaac and Arthur Bears, of Sydney C. B. Robert Bears now of Manila, Philippine Island, William H. Bears, of Peter's Road; Mrs. George Reynolds, of Cambridge; Mrs. William McDonald, and Mrs. W. L. McLean, of Peter's Road; Mrs. Fulford Griffith, of Montague, and Mrs. Orie Keith, of Boston. Four brothers and three sisters still survive him, and are settled in different parts of the island and in the United States.
